# THE 2006 MARC NATIONAL MEET "FORD FEVER"

Anyone with the "Ford Illness" should have been cured on our last tour. We departed on Wednesday June 21 and spent the night in Paducah, Kentucky, visiting the National Quilt Museum. We arrived in Dearborn, Michigan the next evening and rested up for our first treatment. Early Friday morning we were at The Henry Ford, visiting Greenfield Village, the home of many historical buildings preserved by Henry Ford. Among the buildings we saw were the Henry Ford's Bagley Avenue workshop where he built his first car, his childhood farmhouse, the Wright brother's Cycle Shop and home, Edison's Menlo Park lab complex, and the Heinz house where ketchup and horseradish were first made.



A train ride around the complex allows you to see all the buildings.



We ate lunch in the Village, and then proceeded to the Ford Rouge Factory tour where our beloved Model A was built. The 20 millionth Ford was on display, a 1931 Model A Town Sedan. Saturday was spent at the Henry Ford Museum where we saw the actual first car Henry Ford built, extensive collections of wagons, buggies, cars, farm machinery, trains, and steam engines, as well as extensive collections of interest to the women, silver, furniture, heating stoves, era room displays, etc.



Saturday night we toured to Grand Rapids, Michigan for the MARC National Meet. The parts swap meet opened early Sunday morning and registration in the afternoon. A variety if seminars were held throughout the week for both the men and women. A welcome picnic was held Tuesday evening. Wednesday evening there was an era fashion show surrounded by the show cars, culminating with an ice cream social. Susan Meloan advanced to Junior Judge for era fashions. The mandatory tour on Thursday was to the Gilmore Car Museum, and the banquet Friday evening provided the final cure for Ford Fever.

# THE FASHION SCENE AT GRAND RAPIDS

The fashion committee had a very active time at the MARC National Meet in Grand Rapids. On Tuesday, they sponsored a hat and hair ornament seminar with a display of more than 150 hats and hair ornaments. These were from Esther Meyer's and Mary Markes' collection. Julie Klutz moderated the seminar and described the hats giving the variations in types, including cloches, skulls, turbans, and brimmed hats. She pointed out the differences in the styles and changes from the early part of the 'Era' in 1928 to later years in 1931. The earlier hats came very low on the face and neck and covered most of the hair, which was very short at time. As the 'Era' came to end ladies started letting their hair grow a little, and hats became somewhat smaller letting some of the hair show. Members of the fashion committee modeled the hats and circulated through the audience.

The display and seminar included men's hats. It featured top hats, boaters, panamas, fedoras, and golf or driving caps. Modern hats suitable for a reproduction outfit were shown. There were samples of handmade crocheted hats. Instructions for crocheted hats were included in the handout. Someone skilled in this art could use one to complete a reproduction ensemble. Esther also had some real interesting dust caps that ladies used to cover their hair when doing housework. She made these from instructions in "Fashion Service", a magazine published in those years by the Women's Institute of Domestic Arts and Sciences.



On Wednesday morning, those having assembled outfits were judged on overall appearance, major garment, headgear/hairdo, makeup, coordinated apparel, accessories, and footgear. Attention was paid the suitable coordination of all parts of the outfit, authenticity, and condition of garments or items. Black seemed to be the predominant color. Most outfits were suitable for dressy afternoon affairs and included hats. The majority of the shoes had some type of strap. There were several evening outfits that featured hair ornaments as well.



All fashion judging entrants participated in the Fashion show, and received their award. Two participates, Phyllis Pease and Madeline Joy Shafer, received a "Clara" award. In order to win this prestigious award, a participant must receive all 150 of the available points.



Phyllis wore an original 1931 daytime dress made from black rayon and satin. The shirt had alternating bands of the two fabrics. The glossy satin contrasted with the rayon. She wore a black felt cloche with trapunto flowers around the crown. She carried a black and beige tapestry purse, and wore black kid buckle shoes. Her accessories included black and crystal beads and earrings.

Madeline Joy wore a reproduction toddler dress made of yellow and blue cotton calico. It was short sleeved and accented with a light blue grosgrain ribbon tied on the side front. She wore cotton turned down socks and black patent Mary Jane shoes, a cotton slip and bloomers. She looked adorable with her short curly hair.

# NOTES FROM THE MODEL A GARAGE By Jim McPherson

When Henry Ford told a New York Times reporter that ethyl alcohol was "the fuel of the future" in 1925, he was expressing an opinion that was widely shared in the automotive industry. "The fuel of the future is going to come from fruit, from apples, weeds, sawdust – almost anything," he said. "There is fuel in every bit of vegetable matter that can be fermented. There's enough alcohol in one year's yield of an acre of potatoes to drive the machinery necessary to cultivate the fields for a hundred years." From Alcohol – 1925's Fuel of the Future by Neil Maken.

A fellow Model A'er has reported an unusual case of his Model A overheating. An otherwise well performing tour car rather suddenly developed an overheating problem isolated to the cooling system. In evaluating the overheating problem, the upper radiator hose and thermostat were removed. The thermostat was stopped up with material which was previously powder coating. Some of the cooling system components had been powder coated, both on the outside and the inside. The powder coating had come off the inside, and at least part of it stopped up the thermostat. It is reported that antifreeze, water pump lubricant and anticorrosion agents in the cooling system, and Water Wetter may be responsible for the powder coating coming loose. This Model A owner is wondering what the inside of his radiator may look like!

• ne of the most common Model A complaints is the lack of good brakes. While it is my belief that the original equipment mechanical brakes can provide \_\_\_\_\_\_ great brakes for the Model A Ford, I realize the comfort level hydraulic brakes provide some owners. The most common hydraulic brake conversion has been to the 1939 to 1948 Ford hydraulic brakes, although there has been the more radical four wheel disc brakes, using the Model A wire wheels, available for some time. Most recently the Model A brake backing plates have been reproduced and hydraulic brakes adapted to them, preserving some of the original appearance.

An article has recently been reprinted from an old "American Rodder" magazine in Ford "A" Speed Technology on installing Ford F-100 hydraulic brakes on our Model A's. This article is also available at www.flatheadv8.org. These brakes were used on the 1/2 ton Ford F-100 pickup from 1948 to 1956, and the drums are the same through 1963. The drum diameter is 11 inches, the same as our Model A (the 1939-1948 drums are 12 inches), and they also fit the Model A wire wheel. The advantage to these hydraulic brakes is they are selfenergizing, just like the modern hydraulic brakes we are accustomed to. The difference in braking efficiency is dramatic. With these brakes, the shoes are hooked together at the bottom with a spring and adjustor. As you apply the brakes, the front brake shoe makes contact with the drum. and tries to rotate with it. That movement is transferred through the adjustor to the rear brake shoe, pushing it into the drum with increased force, giving better brakes.

#### A REVIEW OF SOME GREAT SOURCES FOR ERA FASHIONS!

Sometimes some unusual finds can be located on the Internet. A search for some "Fashion Service" magazines for the Model A Era turned up two CD's – one with the fashion material from "Fashion Service" and "The Delineator" for 1928, and the other one with articles from "The Delineator", "Fashion Service" and " Vogue Dressmaking" from 1930. These two CD's are available from Harrington Enterprises. (Address listed below)

Harrington has scanned the primary source material from these publications and made them available in Adobe Acrobat\* format. The pages are duplicated exactly as they appeared in the original publication, and are intended for use with dressmaking research. Only factual information pertaining to dressmaking and fashion is included. All fictional work is excluded. The 1928 disk has 201 pages, and the 1930 –379.

"Fashion Service" was published by Woman's Institute of Domestic Arts & Sciences, and is a very informative source on the construction of items that can be used with Model Reproduction ensembles. One issue on the



1928 disk gives detail instructions for making a taffeta cloche, including trimming details. There are exact measurements and explicit diagrams. Another gives instructions for making a slip. These can be made by following the instructions and without a pattern. There are also a number of pictures of patterns that were available at that time.

"The Delineator" features a large selection of Butterick patterns. Vogue Pattern Service published "Vogue Dressmaking" It features many Vogue patterns along with a number of hints about fabrics, and styling to flatter various figure types.

These CD's are a valuable source of original material. Harrington Enterprises should be commended for scanning this material and making it available for purchase. Take a look at: <u>www.dressmakingresearch.com</u>.

# Beach Pajamas

Fashion had answered the needs of sun seekers in the Model A era by making chie outfits for the beach and its surrounds. Though pajamas were first introduced in the 1920's as informal dinner dress or nightwear for sleeping, they died quickly as fashions. However, the third use of them as a practical beach outfit caught on and pajamas evolved into an essential garment to pack for vacation. By 1929 it was an established fact that the thing to wear at the beach was pajamas.

A three-piece beach pajama set typically had widely flared trousers with a yoke at the waist, a top which might be worn tucked-in, and a long overjacket. Tops were often scooped in back to permit tanning, and were usually sleeveless or had shoulder straps. Women could then show off a tanned back in low-backed evening
