NOTES FROM THE MODEL A GARAGE



There was some discussion during our May program about the use of gasoline containing 10% ethanol, the gasohol we have been use to seeing for some time.

This is different than the 85% ethanol currently in the news, which requires vehicle modifications for its use. When ethanol burns, less energy is released, compared to gasoline. The good news is that this loss of energy is not large enough for you to be able to notice it while driving. As you might expect, with a decrease in energy there will be a decrease in fuel economy. Again this should not be a noticeable decrease.

The detrimental effects of ethanol will be seen if you have rubber parts on your Model A, such as fuel or PVC lines, or a fuel pump or carburetor accelerator pump diaphragm. A switch to neoprene parts will be necessary.
