


UPCOMING EVENTS MARCH

SHIMMING ROD AND MAIN BEARINGS

The Shade Tree A's will have their sixth Tech Session on Saturday March 11th. Arrive at eight for breakfast at the Golden Corral on Bobby Jones. Then travel to Richard's around 9 for the morning activities. Schedule an evaluation, adjustment or repair on your Model A, or learn how to adjust the clearance on Babbitt bearings. Ford recommended adjustment every 5,000 miles. It's a sure way to extend engine life, just ask an engine rebuilder. Jim Brown provides a hands on seminar on adjusting bearing clearance. Tony and Carole Gazette have promised us a gourmet meal, and we all know when they do something, they do it right. So, there will be a free lunch for you, compliments of the STAs, if you are lucky enough to successfully adjust the main bearings in your Model A during the tech session. So crank up the old A, come on over and give it a try.


MAFCA NATIONAL MEET




NOTES FROM THE MODEL A GARAGE



With the introduction of the Model A Ford, several comadvertised panies their products to assure the motoring public their products were acceptable for use in the new car. In a 1928 Standard Oil Company Brochure, after recognizing the requirements for the Model T, acknowledged the "new" Model A Ford. "Engine speed and cylinder compression have been increased in the Model A. Horsepower has been doubled. An oil pump has been installed. Under these new conditions, Socony Motor Oil Medium is recommended for the new Ford engine, except cold weather when Socony Light Medium is recommended. Socony Cup Grease is recommended for the clutch collar, and Socony Gear Oil or transmission lubricant for the transmission."





Some Model A owners replacing the generator with an alternator are concerned by the slight misalignment of the fan belt. The misalignment is due to the design of the alternator pulley. Abbie Prince located a pulley designed to correct this condition. Another way to correct this condition is to place flat washers (usually 4) on the backside of the alternator mount, and on the front side of the motor mount, where the generator was originally located. This moves the alternator and aligns the pulleys

For March we will bring toiletries and such items include toothpaste (individual size), deodorant (male/female), lotions (individual size), hair accessories including some for African American children, hair care items (shampoo & conditioner) and other items suitable for children or teenagers.

While we invite all our members to attend the meetings, you do not have to attend in order to participate. You are very welcome to send some items with the men, and we will collect them. Frankie has volunteered to deliver them for us.

I bought a vintage housedress from Anne Beck several years ago. The dress is an original design from 1928-29 era. It is cream colored with tangerine flowers with accent colors. It has a drop waist that goes down to a point in the front. It has two pleats in the front and none in the back. This style housedress has a collar and cuff in a darker shade to match the color in the fabric. The neckline is a V shape with a medium width pointed collar. At the cuff on the sleeve there is and added piece of material forming a V before the cuff. Most day dresses were sleeveless but for the fall and winter they tended to be longer sleeves.





I like to display my housedress with a vintage apron that I got from my grandmother. This peach colored apron is hand stitched and has a hand embroidered design of a lady dressed in her era dress. The necktie is an all one piece and the side ties are loose. The bottom of the apron has scalloped edges.
