



## NOTES FROM THE MODEL A GARAGE

In search of the perfect materials to use in our restorations, powder coating has now taken a place of prominence, but there may be some misconceptions about powder coating. One of the most important may be that powder coating does not chip. This is not true. With enough effort, powder coating will chip (but should never flake off), so to avoid a chipped rim or parts, protect them from sharp contact. Do not hit the edges of the rims, as that is where the stress is. Wrap them with shrinkwrap or a foam rubber carpet pad. Do not use bubble wrap. Bubble wrapped powder coated parts get wet and etches the powder coated surface. It Is OK to use masking tape, but if it is left on and dries out it will damage the powder coating.

Automotive soap and water are the best to keep powder coating clean. Other soaps, such as Simple Green are corrosive, and will dull the finish. Armor-All sprayed on and left overnight will buff out the next day with a clean terry cloth rag to give a gloss. Carnuba wax is the best to protect powder coated parts. Micro scratches cause dulling of the powder coated surface. They can be removed with compound or polish, using the same methods you would on an automotive finish. You can even paint over a powder coated surface. Many of our fellow hobbyists in Florida are using it as a primer. Just sand the powder coated surface to get a paintable surface and paint with automotive paint. Treat the

powder coated surface like an automotive finish, and keep it clean to avoid micro scratches. THANKS to Bob La Follette of the Henry's A's Chapter, MAFCA, for this information.

DuPont Refinish has established a free online library of virtually every color chip DuPont has produced since introducing Duco nitrocellulose lacguer in 1924. Located in the Color section of the DuPont Performance Coatings (www.performancecoatings.dupont.com), the Du-Pont Refinish Historical Color Library is a searchable application that allows you to view, print or download a scanned image of every automotive and truck color chip DuPont has produced since 1924. Although scanned images of chips, or even the chips themselves, are not exact reproductions of the original colors, they will give you the text information as well as the approximate visuals of the colors.

For you go fast guys, the reproduction Stromberg 97 carburetor is now available. The 97 is one of the most sought after downdraft carburetors for Model A's, B's and early Ford V-8's.

1/2- teaspoon celery flakes

- 2- teaspoons garlic powder
  - 1- teaspoon dried thyme
- 2- teaspoons onion powder
  - 1- teaspoon dried basil
- 2- tablespoons dried parsley
- 1- teaspoon dried oregano 1-teaspoon salt
- 1-teaspoon ground black pepper

Place all ingredients in a small mixing bowl and stir well. Then store in an airtight container for up to three months.


