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NOTES FROM THE MODEL A GARAGE By Jim McPherson



On each Club activity where we drive our Model A's, the importance of being able to communicate with each other is evident. No means of communication is perfect. Even with modern cell phones, there is a lack of coverage on many of the back roads we travel. Likewise, CB radios suffer from the same lack of coverage, as when in the mountains. One good thing about the lack of coverage with a CB, is it last only for a short period of time be-

fore being, at least temporarily restored. Some clubs report success with hand-held two-way radios. We have not been so fortunate. For our driving events, a CB radio is a necessity, and should be a requirement.

Communication puts your mind at ease when you see your fellow Club member on the side of the road. You can easily determine if there is a need for assistance, notify the best people to help correct the problem, and improve safety by keeping numerous cars

from stopping on the side of the road to see what has happened. CB's are useful to relay local road and traffic conditions, tour directions, gas stops, restroom stops, and those all important restaurant stops.

There are two basic types of CB radios used in our Club. One is a handheld unit. For these to work well, you need an external antenna. The radios with the antenna an integral part of the radio seem to lack the range of coverage offered by those having an external antenna. If you use an external antenna with a handheld CB, you have the antenna cord and antenna placement to contend with. These radios are usually battery operated, thus battery life and recharging needs should be considered. These concerns are overcome by using a CB radio powered off the battery of your Model A. If you have converted your electrical system to 12

> volts, you are all set to install a CB radio. If not, you may want to consider an inverter to power your CB. These units are readily available from Model A parts suppliers, and convert 6 volts to 12 volts. You may also consider powering your CB directly off an auxiliary 12 volt battery. You may use a batterv car or а smaller battery used to power emergency exit lights. Both provide good battery life while on tour.

We have found good antenna location to be important. Mounted to an external rear view mirror, on top of the car, or to a post which raises the antenna base to the height of the car works best. You will see examples of these mounts on Club cars. Regardless of your preference, a CB radio is rapidly becoming a touring requirement.

VINTAGE VISIONS

Delineator Magazine June, 1928 shows us "Summer Chic." These classic summer frock patterns of 1928 are ready to be made to wear to an afternoon tea party or a summer garden party.



Dress #2066 is a formal afternoon frock and is described as having three points of "chic," from the evening mode; an uneven hemline, a shirred bodice, and a snugly girdled hip line. It is shown made of gray Georgette with lace.

Dress #2070 has two tiers of circular flounces that are put on diagonally across the front of this smart frock and push most of their flare to one side. The "Bertha" touches the waistline in back and is caught up with a bow in the front. The sash adds to the flatter of the left side. The dress is made of pink Georgette.

Dress #2072 is a printed afternoon frock and is described as an "important charming fashion."

The straight gathered skirt is scalloped but it may have un uneven lower edge instead of the <u>new</u> backward dip. The wide griddle is of ribbon and follows the upward line of the skirt.
