Thoughts from the President



We will spend Thursday night at Blackbeard's Lodge, built in 1936 (800-892-5314 or 252-928-3421).

Friday we will tour the Outer Banks, stopping at such historical sights as the Cape Hatteras Lighthouse, through Nags Head and Kitty Hawk.

We will spend Friday night at the Holiday Inn Express in Elizabeth City, NC (252-338-8900), and arrive in Williamsburg Saturday. Hotel rooms in the Williamsburg area are at a premium. Williamsburg is not only a prime tourist attraction, but it is also the 400th anniversary of the founding of Jamestown. If you have any feeling that you might like to go, I would encourage you to make your hotel reservations now.

The host hotel is the Woodlands Hotel & Suites (Deluxe Suites \$179, Superior Room Class, \$137), and the overflow hotel is the Cascades Motel (\$116). Additional lodging is available in the Governor's Inn (\$105) and the Williamsburg Lodge (\$179). Reservations for any of the above hotels may be made by calling 1-800-261-9530.

Most of the national chain motels we usually stay in are full. Some of us will be staying at the Quality Inn Colony (309 Page St, www.choicehotels.com). You may want to visit the Williamsburg Meet website (<u>http://</u> <u>clubs.hemmings.com/colvamodela/</u>) for a preview of what awaits you at the MARC National Meet.
