LOLA 6

When it comes to the Model A Ford, I have always been a purist! Over the past seventeen years I have bought, sold, restored over a dozen Model A's and every A, with the exception of my Speedster (Lola 3), had to be "just as Henry built it". I have judged Model A's from Greenville, SC to Hershey, PA at various AACA events, not to mention several National MARC and MAFCA meets along the way. Somehow, I always wanted the full experience from my antique cars including all of the shakes, rattles and

vibrations the original drivers had to deal with on a regular basis. My opinion had always been, if I want a more com-fortable ride, I'd take my modern car!

On the other hand, after listening for many years to other owners bragging about the many modifications they had made to

improve power and comfort, I decided it was time for me to give a few of them a try. So, in order to preserve my "purist" reputation, I set out to build ONE car with ALL the improvements and hopefully end up with the ultimate touring Model A. "Lola 6" is the result of that decision and it is quite interesting how different this A is when compared to all of my other originals!

"Lola 6" is a 1931 Model A Ford Victoria Steelback that was literally built from "scratch"! The body and doors are the only parts that were from a single car! All other parts from the frame up were acquired during many trips to Hershey and other swap meets. Due to several other Model A

projects I had going on at the time, this restoration took several years to complete but to me it was well worth the wait.

Now, here are the modifications. "Lola 6" is powered by a rebuilt "B" Engine with a V-8 clutch and pressure plate. It has been converted to a 12-volt system with an alternator to support the halogen headlights, turn signals and the in-line fuel shut-off valve installed due to the indented firewall.



Vibrations were reduced by a set of Float-A-Motor mounts and it runs quietly thanks to a new Aires muffler. A very stable and comfortable ride is accomplished by a set of modern shocks and 17" tires and wheels. Finally, I now have a Model A with a heater. That's a first for me!

I'm looking forward to enjoying all of the "creature comforts" my new Vicky has to offer, but I will always prefer "Henry's Ladies" being restored as close to original as possible.

By the way, the name "Lola" was given to my Model As by my wife when I built my first Town Sedan for show. When I asked her why she chose that name she replied, 'have your ever heard the song "Whatever Lola Wants, Lola Gets"?' Somehow I just couldn't argue with that!

Now I'm wondering if "Lola 6" wants Air Conditioning! We'll see!




RECENT EVENTS

Vest, Shirts, Jackets


Shade Tree A's vest, shirts and jackets are now available. Purchase your favorite shirt, jacket, or vest and give it to Jim McPherson and

NOTES FROM THE MODEL A GARAGE

The May 2007 (Vol. 31, No. 10) issue of **Skinned Knuckles** continues the Motor Service Repair Manual booklet on raising the engine compression ratio. It amazes me that they use the Model A engine and head to illustrate many of the topics.

The most popular, and least expensive, method to increase the compression ratio is by planning the cylinder head. The booklet proceeds to define and illustrate how to find the compression ratio, piston displacement and clearance volume (the volume of the combustion chamber with the piston at top dead center) of an engine.

Next, the booklet describes how to find the amount the compression ratio should be raised to obtain maximum power and economy. For most engines, this is at least one full compression ratio, noting that low compression engines, such as our Model A engine, show additional gains with even greater increases in the compression ratio. Next, they illustrate how to calculate the amount to reduce the compression chamber volume in order to increase the compression ratio to the desired ratio. Then, you determine the amount to be planed from the cylinder head to obtain the desired compression ratio. Other methods which raise the compression ratio are also discussed, such as by using higher pistons or replacing the head with one designed with a combustion chamber for a higher com-pression ratio.

Examination of the planed head prior to installation is discussed, as well as an assessment of the condition of the engine itself. Pistons, piston rings, cylinder wall wear and bearing wear are some of the things which may affect the performance of an

engine which has had its compression ratio raised. The information for this portion of this article was condensed from nine pages in the Skinned Knuckles article listed above.


