




Off The Running Board

Tech Tip of the Month

.... Jim McPherson

August, 2010: STA member Dr. Stuart Smith shares an interesting comparison of penetrating oils:

Machinist's Workshop magazine actually tested penetrating oils for break out torque on rusted nuts. They obtained significant results! They performed a subjective test of popular penetrating oils with the control being the torque required to remove the nut from a "scientifically rusted" environment. The results are relative to 'naturally rusted' equivalent conditions.

Penetrating oil	Average load
None	516 pounds
WD-40	. 238 pounds
PB Blaster	214 pounds
Liquid Wrench	127 pounds
Kano Kroil	106 pounds
ATF-Acetone mix	53 pounds

The Automatic Transmission fluid (ATF)-Acetone mix was a "home brew" mix of 50 - 50 automatic transmission fluid and acetone. Note the "home brew" was better than any commercial product in this one particular test. A local machinist group mixed up a batch and all now use it with equally good results. Note also that "Liquid Wrench" is about as good as "Kroil" for about 20% of the price.

The Pony Express Tour was MAFCA's first National Tour and it was well planned by Jim and Melissa Spawn and Dick and Lois Przywitowski. One group started from St. Joe, MO and the other from Sacramento, CA; both met in Casper, WY. You traveled at your own pace but needed to be at the



Breaking in a new engine

With all the engine rebuilding that has occurred within the STA members this year,
engine break-in is an important factor to consider for your "new" engine.
Ora Landis, of Schwalm's in Strasburg, PA, has given us permission to reprint his procedure. Thanks, Mr. Landis!

Schwalm's Engine Break-in Instructions

Engine oil must be added to your newly-rebuilt engine. The Model A has a 5 quart capacity. To begin the break-in of the engine, put 4 quarts of SAE 15W-40 detergent oil in the crankcase. Add a fifth quart through the distributor hole in the head. This allows the mains to have oil before the oil pump can feed the mains. Along with the new oil, you should add a bottle of ZDDPlus—this restores the zinc and phosphorus levels in the oil, which have been reduced for emission purposes. However, testing has shown that these additives are needed for fiat tappet cam engines. Without them, premature camshaft and tappet wear may occur. You may purchase a bottle of this additive from us, or any other ZDDPlus dealer.

Also at this time, make sure your radiator is topped off with water. (When at all possible, use distilled water with Water Wetter Anti-Corrosive (made by Redline) instead of antifreeze. After several weeks; antifreeze could be used, if needed.

Note: Ignition/Carburetion. It is important that the distributor and carburetor are also rebuilt or in good working order to ensure that your newly-rebuilt engine will run and perform as Henry meant it to. Time your distributor and adjust your carburetor according to Ford specifications. It is also important to clean your gas tank and to use new gas. Old gas can be problematic in a newly-rebuilt engine.

Note: To ensure proper fuel mixture and no exhaust leak, the manifold should be checked for straightness. If warped, the manifold can be resurfaced as a matched pair intake and exhaust. Having this done also lessens the chance of a cracked manifold, since the manifold will not be stressed when bolted to the engine.

CAUTION: Do not at any time place heavy strain on the engine during the break-in period. If you follow the break in instructions you can expect long engine life.

Starting the engine for break-in: Run the engine for a period of ten to fifteen minutes, just above idle with the spark half advanced. After ten to fifteen minutes of running, allow the engine to cool down. Repeat this process for a total of two hours' running time. Blue smoke may appear at the tailpipe. This is because the pistons rings are not seated; the piston rings can take up to 1,000 miles to seat to the cylinder wall.

For the third hour of stationary engine running, increase the period of running to 20 to 30 minutes—(again, just above idle with the spark half advanced) Engine acceleration during this period is acceptable with momentary bursts only, then returning to just above idle.

After the three hours of running time. re-torque the head to 50/55 foot lbs. See the diagram to the right for the proper torque sequence. The head gaskets tend to compress during the engine warm-up. An oil change is also suggested at this time. (SAE 15W

-40 detergent oil with a new bottle of ZDDPlus)


Now you are ready for the road! If the initial three hours of running time is completed without the engine stopping and/or excessive heat, you are definitely ready for the road.

After 200 miles have been put on the engine, not exceeding 35 MPH, an oil change is necessary. (SAE 15W-40 detergent oil with a bottle of ZDDPlus)

Note: Full break-in may not occur until 500 miles have been put on the engine, depending on driving conditions. During this time, keep your speed at or below 35MPH.

Note: Oil changes should be made every 500 miles or every driving season, whichever comes first. Remember to use SAE 15W-40 detergent oil with a bottle of ZDDPlus.

In talking with many oil company representatives, we feel that detergent oils are worth using because of their superior lubricating abilities, when compared to nondetergent oils. However, it is important to keep the oil changed every 500 miles with detergent oils. A new bottle of ZDDPlus should be added with each oil change.
