INSURING YOUR ANTIQUE AUTO

The September meeting program was an informative program on the importance of insurance for Model A's and other collectible cars.

Walker Crosby has over 26 years experience with insurance. His recommendation is that you have at minimum \$100,000 per person/\$300,000 per occurrence; better yet, \$500,000 . If you really want to be protected, get an umbrella policy.

Walker says that antique car coverage is very reasonable as long as all drivers in the family have a "daily driver" and are adequately covered. Just make sure the coverage you get is compatible with the type of driving you do.

Dresses for Busy School Days Woman's World October 1930

I have been helping with the school display for the MAFFI Museum which will include the Huff and Puff school bus and a school room setting. Most people these days seem to think that school dresses back then were long and so was hair, but not so. Toddlers and school age girls wore short dresses and their hair in a bob or medium length. I found these school dress patterns in the October 1930 edition of Woman's World.

-803 was designed for 2, 4, and 6 years. Notice that the bloomers show.

-804 was designed for 8, 10, 12, and 14 years. There is a nice contrast of light and dark material.

-2657 was designed for 2, 4, and 6 years. Also the bloomers show for that age group.

-2629 was designed for 8, 10, 12, and 14 years. It had the natural waist line that started in the 30's.

-2659 was designed for 6, 8, 10, and 12 years. The pockets add charm to this dress.

- Turn into the driveway just past mailbox 1557. The house is set back off the road.




