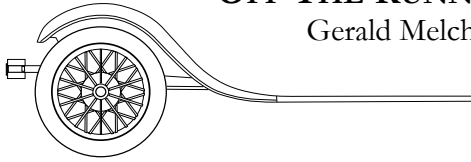

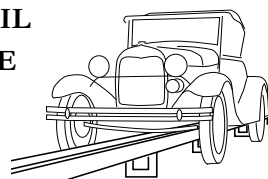

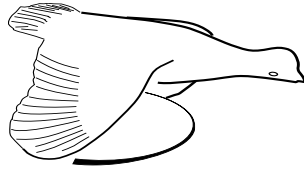

Larry Komp provided an interesting hands-on technical program about front end alignment.

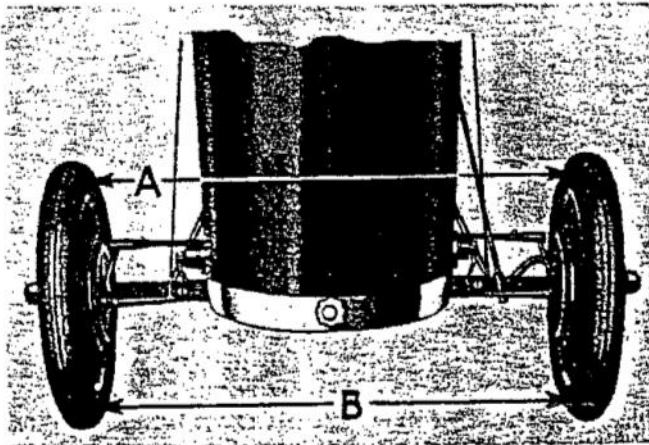
The Gordons put out lovely display of refreshments with a St. Patrick's Day theme.



TECHNICAL PROGRAM

March 11

FORD SERVICE BULLETIN September 1928, page 283 fig. 576:
Front wheel toe-in should be $\frac{1}{16}$ of inch, plus or minus $\frac{1}{32}$
(A greater than B).



Model A Front End Alignment

1. The basic front end must be reasonably tight and secure. Check for front end slop or wiggle. If the spindle bolts (kingpins) are loose & worn, you may have to fix this before alignment can begin. Also, check where the radius rod ball connects to clutch housing. If loose tighten first before doing alignment. Check that all the drag link and tie-rod connectors are correctly adjusted.
 2. Jack the front of the car front end up, use chalk and coat the center of each tire all the way around.
 3. Hold homemade alignment tool so the 'Points' scribe a fine line on each tire.
 4. Lower car back on to the floor, then roll the car 3 feet forward.
 5. Maneuver and adjust alignment tool to measure the distance on the back side of front end tires.
 6. Now place tool on the front side of tires, use a rule to measure the difference. Turning the tie rod, adjust the Tow-In to be $\frac{1}{16}$ inch to $\frac{1}{8}$ inch (See illustration).
 7. Tighten everything down and drive. Also good time to grease all front end fittings.

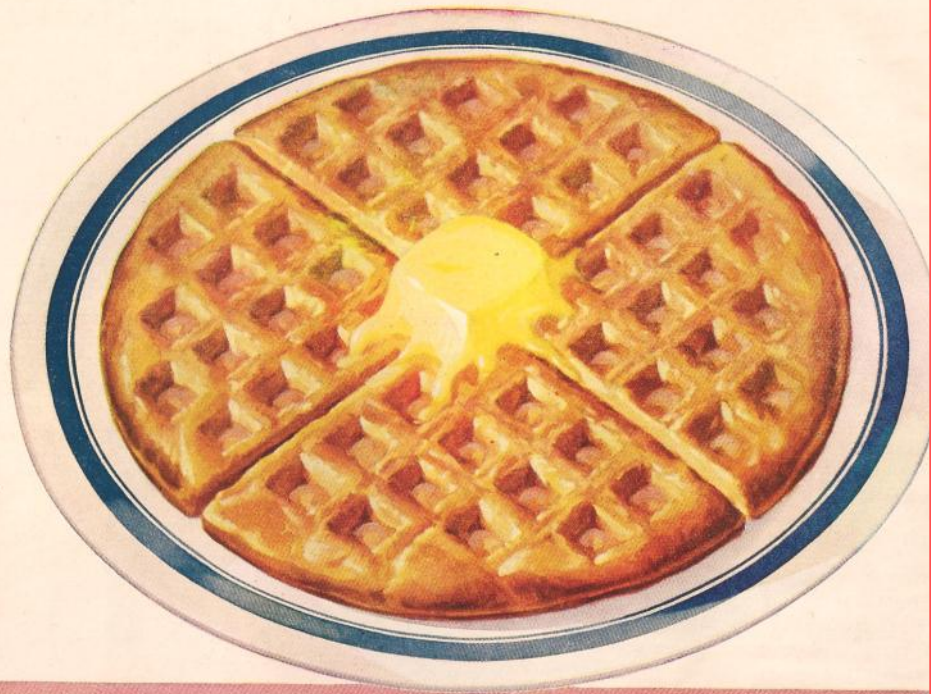
