Probably every Model A owner has had that sinking feeling when you're test driving the car after a major, or even minor repair, and you hear a clink or a thud as you're zipping down the road. You hope that it was that non-guaranteed offbrand screw driver with the chip out of the blade that was perhaps left on the running board rather than some irreplaceable original part.

The first time it happened to me, I heard a "thunk" and vaguely noted my surroundings. I could find nothing missing so after many days I put the thought (and the vague recollection of the place) out of my mind. By the time we noticed the prop knob was missing from the roof, I had only the slightest notion of where I'd been the day of the "thunk". We walked up and down the street for days kicking leaves and looking into gutters to no avail.

After our transmission rebuild project in December, Brian was out for a late-night test drive with me in the passenger seat. As we rounded the block Brian said it was probably the nut from the muffler clamp that he hadn't tightened because he still needed to put muffler cement under the clamp which we didn't have (and which I now remember we still need to get); unfortunately that nut was still in place so there must have been something else missing.

A few days later while we were washing the greasy hand prints off the car. A neighbor came by

and was describing something that happened to the timing pin on his car years ago. He pointed to the timing pin and, you guessed it (the photo was a give away), it was not there. I suggested a walk to find it but Brian assured me we'd never find such a small, dark item along the road. He found a bolt the right size to plug the hole, sawed it off, and we were in business.

A couple of days later on my walk to work. I passed the place where we'd been driving. I decided to walk in the road rather than on the sidewalk on



the chance I might see it. I walked across the 25foot-deep strip of grass separating the street from the sidewalk, stepped into the street, and there was the timing pin! I popped it in my pocket and made it to work with time to spare.

The moral: Look before you leave.



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
