

### RUNS GREAT, JUST WON'T START! Rachel d'Entremont

Since returning from the July 21st Technical Session I have been having trouble starting my car. Because it was taking 20 to 30 minutes to get it started, I quit driving it.

Before calling in the troops, I tried a few things on my own: I cleaned some black stuff out of the sediment bowl, cleaned the fuel line with a pipe cleaner (which got the gas flowing which wasn't the case when I removed the drain on the sediment bowl), and charged the battery. None of those things seemed to make any difference.

Tom came over and cleaned the carburetor jets and replaced the gaskets (which were pretty beat up). No change.

Tom took out my Champion 3X spark plugs which were VERY dirty and I cleaned them until they were things of beauty. While I cleaned the plugs, Tom made a slight adjustment to the points; no change.

We finally got it running and he checked the spark by touching a screwdriver to the spark plug and the engine which resulted in a very weak spark. We gave up for the day and out of desperation to find an inexpensive fix, I ordered a new coil-to – distributor wire. The wire arrived from Smith and Jones two days later but needed assembly and soldering. Wouldn't you think that if "some assembly required" applied, it would say so in the catalog? But that's another story.

Meanwhile, Tom dropped by and left a used coil and a new coil-to-distributor wire (which did not need assembly). Being careful to label the orientation of the old coil so that the replacement would be aligned the same way, I replaced the coil and wire. It was going to be soooo cool to do a job on my own. And I did! Successfully. Unfortunately it didn't help the starting problem.

Eric returned from his vacation and came out

in torrential rain to check on the problem. If you aren't aware, Eric's tool box is like a rolling parts and tool store! Just in case Tom's used coil had expired, Eric pulled out a new, still-in-the-box coil. It was installed and, you guessed it, no change. Next he pulled out a new condenser. Still no luck.

One home-altered item in Eric's well-stocked toolbox is a distributor cap from which two sides have been cut away allowing the sparks inside the distributor to be observed. With this dandy cutaway cap, the car started right up and it was apparent that each of the spark plugs were doing its job. My cap was the culprit.

I sprayed WD-40 into the top of the cap, wrapped steel wool around the ends of a finetipped pair of needle-nose pliers and scrubbed the corrosion from the top of the cap into which the wire is inserted. Finally, success!

A new distributor cap was ordered from Smith and Jones; problem solved.

Thanks, again, to my Model A support group.

The Saturday Technical Programs are set up, see the newsletter.


Parades were discussed and you will see them in the newsletter. Boy, what a job Rachel is doing.





#### A RESTORATION STORY

This is a story about restoring a 28 Model A Sport Coupe body. A few years back while living in Colorado I came across a 28 Sport Coupe body sitting on a ranch that, at first glance, looked pretty solid. Well, by our standards in our warm, wet climate, it was pretty solid but had been out in the weather a long time and needed work - a lot of work. In my youth I "apprenticed" with a local auto body guy who had a number of Model A's, and his work was old school. Gas welding, hammer welding, lots of hammer and dolly work. I picked up body-work skills from him having completely disassembled about a half dozen Model A bodies, cleaning and repairing them, and building them back up. We used to joke that I was a "Journeyman Riveter" because I became the ace riveter when re-assembling these bodies. None of these talents are all that hard to acquire-it just takes a good teacher, good equipment, and hours of practice. But if I can do it, anyone can if they are willing to learn.

It was with this experience in mind that I tackled the Sport Coupe. I became friends with Steve Becker who owns and operates Bert's Model A in Denver. I told him to be on the lookout for a 28/29 chassis while I worked on the body. At the time he was sometimes getting a half dozen Model A chassis a month, coming from street-rodders who wanted

just the body and certainly none of that ancient iron. Steve soon found me a chassis.

I am never a proponent of taking things apart unless they need to come apart.
However, I soon learned that the subframe on this Sport Coupe was not as solid as I had

thought. Also, even if it had been solid it was too rusty and I can't allow rust in the sheet metal joints as it will cause trouble later. So here we go-this old car body had to come apart for repair. The Sport Coupe is actually a pretty simple body so after removing panel rivets I had the quarter panels off in very little time. Lots of powdery iron oxide fell to the floor as I knocked sheet metal and sub-frame parts around. I had all metal parts professionally cleaned at Denver Metal Cleaning. Cleanliness is next to Godliness when it comes to body work!

I soon learned that I had sub-frame repair to perform. Of course, we are lucky today to be able to buy Model A sheet metal already formed-some better than others, but at least something to work with. I cut the back side rails as they were hopelessly pin-holed and had chunks missing, and welded new half-rails in. This is not for the faint of heart, as measurements and fit-up needs to be precise or you will have a mess putting it back together. I built a layout jig using a sheet of plywood and nails that outlined the original rails.

I also had sheet metal to repair, such as the typical bottom rust on quarter panels. Again, we are lucky to have access to reasonably priced sheet metal patch panels. I used to use TIG on sheet metal and was darn good at it, but no longer have the equipment having sold it because I had no room for it. What a mistake! I purchased a MIG machine, a little Miller buzz-box, and it worked OK but I sure don't like the MIG torch compared to my old TIG torch. In any case, I got the panels patched and then spent an obsessive amount of time leading, filing, spraying, and sanding. I replaced the front firewall as it had pieces totally missing. Some of the reproduction sheet metal panels don't fit all that well, so there is inevitably a lot of "tweaking" to be done. I also used lead as a filler in places. Just as with any filler, use only a thin coat and you usually wind up removing most of it, leaving only a very thin layer to fill minor irregularities. After getting the metal repairs done and priming the bare sheet metal, I started with my specialty-riveting. Body rivets are usually made of a soft steel and the rivets do not require heating. Typically, you start by bolting the panel in so that it is square and won't move, then remove one bolt and insert a rivet. I use a waffle tool in a Craftsman air hammer, with a bucking

bar on the backside. It is really a pretty easy process. You often need a second set of hands when riveting, so be sure and have someone available to help with the bucking bar.

I got the body pretty much done and ordered the body wood. At about this stage, I was made an offer that involved me trading this Sport Coupe body and some cash for a 31 Standard Roadster. Since I always wanted an open car, I sold this Sport Coupe and, as I understand it, the Sport Coupe is now nicely painted and a fully operational car somewhere in Wyoming. I thought I would share this story as it might inspire someone to dig in and tackle their body work. I took this same approach when I restored my 26 Model T coupe, taking it completely apart, cleaning the metal, making the repairs, and riveting it back together. Solid as a rock! I will admit, though, that all this work seemed a bit easier and less
