Woman's World for August 1929 had patterns titled "Frocks with Graceful Lines."

This is the first time I have seen mentioned in an article for patterns where it gives a note at the bottom saying;

Note: Size 16 years is the same as size 34, 18 years is the same size as 36.

Years and bust sizes were how patterns were sold which suggested that these guidelines were for the customer so they would pick the appropriate frock for their age or size.

Number 553 is a cute one-piece dress with tucks designed for sizes 2, 4, and 6 years. It would be cute in a cotton fabric, with a white contrasting collar.

Number 538 is a cute junior sports dress designed for sizes 6, 8, 10, 12, and 14 years.

Number 2851 a pretty dress designed for 16, 18 years, 36, 38, 40 and 42 inch bust.

I think it would be pretty made in a voile fabric.

Number 3174 with its dignified lines could be worn for spectator sports, such as wearing to watch a tennis match. It was designed for sizes 16, 18 years, 36, 38, 40, and 42 inch bust measurements.

Number 2742, a feminine mode, designed for sizes 16, 18 years, 36, 38, 40, and 42 inch bust measurements. I think it would look good made in a crepe de chine.


