

Those who attended the April 12 meeting were treated to an excellent presentation by Andrew Morse on repairing Model A sheet metal including installing patch panels, preparing and installing patches, epoxy vs. welding, and restoring dented metal.

They were introduced to a large collection of specialized tools: picks, spoons, hammers (both flat and rounded), and dollies (both flat and curved). There were flange tools, cutout tools, and grinders. In addition to the tools, Andrew brought samples to show what the different tools do and how they are used.

The series will continue for the next two months so be sure to put the Monday, May 12th and Monday, June 9th meetings on your calendar. The meetings will be at 7 pm.

McCall's magazine May 1929 showed the latest in sports frocks from Paris. You could wear these dresses for a round of golf or tennis then add a jacket or sweater for afterwards. These were called active sports frocks as compared to spectator sports frocks which would have had sleeves.

The solid red dress is a smart tailored frock with a shaped neckband and shows clever cutting with circular sections inserted on the right side. It also added that sleeves, of course are not used for active sports.

The print dress has a yoke which extends into revers (turned back to show its reversed side) and stitched pleats in the front of the skirt, this is a sports frock of simplicity.

# What is the Social Security Run?

The Social Security Run began in 1996 as a means to get the "old cars' out on the road. The weekend begins on Thursday afternoon with a short tour and a BBQ dinner. The Medicare Tour on Friday provides an opportunity for the participants to get the ailments out of their cars and get them ready for the Run on Saturday.

The Run consists of two parts: a morning tour and an afternoon tour with breaks and lunch included. Participants are encouraged to stop at road-side stands, shops, or other tourist traps along the route.

Each participant records their beginning and ending running time deducting for any breaks, lunch, sightseeing, or mechanical ailments. The vehicle with a total running time nearest the average of all participants is the Grand Prize Winner.

Poker chips will be distributed at designated locations along the route. At the closing banquet on Saturday night, participants exchange their chips for playing cards; the best hand wins a \$150 cash prize.

# Eligible Vehicles

All vehicles participating in the SS Run must be original vehicles manufactured in 1942 or earlier. Any modified vehicles, with the exception of safety equipment or items that would have been available at the time of production, are therefore not allowed to register for this tour. If a vehicle is found to have modifications (kit car, hot rod, etc.) it will not be allowed to participate in the Run.

# Limit: 100 cars/ Deadline: April 15

Confirmation of registration will be sent after the April 15 deadline. If you need to know earlier, watch for your check to clear—then you'll know it's been accepted.





# STA Monthly Meeting Refreshment Guidelines

Refreshments are typically served after the technical program (usually about 7:45-8:00 pm) and the assigned group should help assist with filling cups with ice and pouring soft drinks and any needed preparation for the refreshment, i.e., cutting a cake, opening containers and other general preparations.

The club will provide:

- a. Paper/plastic products such as napkins, plates, cups, bowls, knives, spoons and forks.
- b. These are located in the cabinets in the kitchen area.

Responsibility of assigned refreshment group:


- a. The lead for the group is printed in bold in the newsletter. This person is responsible for contacting the other group members and getting agreement on what each should bring. Contact should be made with the group at least a week in advance of the meeting. It is the individual's responsibility to get a substitute if they are unable to attend the meeting.
- b. Usually there are about 35 people in attendance but plan on 40 people and you will have enough. The group lead needs to ensure that collectively there is enough food for 40 people.
- c. Eight 2-liter bottles of soft drink (or tea) and 20# of ice are usually enough.
- d. It is the group's decision on what to serve but light desserts are just fine, i.e., cake and cookies. Anything homemade is always appreciated but not required.
- e. If you have any questions, they should be directed to the responsible group lead.
