

THINGS THAT GO BUMP IN THE NIGHT

As happens every year about this time, my '28 Roadster has been misbehaving. Since October last year, my car has been driving on a borrowed carburetor and, for almost that long, a borrowed distributor.

My reconditioned distributor was reinstalled in late August but with the heat and daily rain, the car pretty much just stayed in the garage. My first sign of trouble occurred on Model A Day (9/13). After visiting the first of two senior retirement homes, I had trouble starting it. And on the way home it began acting as if starved for gas. I got some crud out of the sediment bowl and it seemed better. The next time I really drove it was to Edgefield (9/19) and it gave me a bit of trouble at the beginning of the trip, behaved perfectly on the 45-mile trip from Aiken to Edgefield and back (in the rain), and began to misbehave less than a half mile from home. The day after Edgefield it really started acting up.

For the next month, one thing after another was tried with seemingly good results...never lasting more than a day (if that long). After draining the gas tank; cleaning filters; checking plugs, coil, & condenser; setting the timing; and about 100 other things; the borrowed distributor was put back on the car and it has been behaving beautifully.

Saturday a friend suggested that I make the 33mile round trip to N. Augusta to an old-car cruisein. (And by the way, there were plenty of STA members there but not another Model A in sight (I don't count the hot rods)).

The car had been out several times during the week and seemed up for the trip. Because I would be coming back to Aiken after dark, I asked my friend to follow me back to Aiken. Normally I go where I need to go and don't expect others to go out of their way for my peace of mind but this

time I did.

About 3 miles into the return trip, I heard a loud clunk and then a flapping sound. After driving about another mile to a lighted parking area, I pulled over expecting to see the remains of a broken belt. The belt was intact.

As most of you know, I am not a mechanic. My normal job is to stand around looking good (something I have not yet mastered) and to fetch tools. But I did recognize that a spark plug appeared to be gone! I have heard that if a plug is not tightened sufficiently, it can blow out through the hood but my hood was, thankfully, intact.

Soon after my distress call, Eric and Dotti arrived to install a plug borrowed from one of their cars and Eric pointed out that the metal parts of the plug were still in the engine but the ceramic part and the wire were nowhere to be found. Six days later I found the brass nut from the top of the spark plug sitting on the passengers-side running board. I figure it had been there for about 25 miles while at times I exceed 45 mph.

It was a relief not to be alone on the side of the road in a strange place at night and more of a relief to have a couple of STA members come to the rescue when things went bump in the night.



POLARIZED SUNGLASSES FOR BETTER VISIBILITY IN RAIN AND FOG

After receiving a tip from Theresa McMullin, I did a little research and found these tips.

Wear polarized sunglasses when driving in rain or fog during the day. First and foremost, forget about driving in an absolute downpour or heavy fog. However, during light to moderate rainfalls or fog, polarized sunglasses will help the driver see more clearly.

Lenses must be polarized. Despite the assertion of many e-mails going around that "any model will do," non-polarized sunglasses will not improve clarity of vision in the rain or fog. Indeed, they will make matters worse.

Don't wear sunglasses while driving at night. Although polarized sunglasses will help improve clarity of vision during the day in rain or fog, at night they will serve to reduce contrast and thus make a mess of the driver's depth perception. This practice is foolhardy and dangerous.

Ten Model A's were on display and at least one broke down on the way!






