windwings with Rain-X, something I should have done before. I don't know if that will help with the on-coming headlights but hopefully if I'm stuck in the rain again, it will lessen the need for the lousy windshield wiper.

Others had an even longer trip home and I imagine they were even more frazzled than I was when they finally made it home.

I will think twice before I participate in an outof-town night-time trip in the future, especially if it's predicted to be a dark and stormy night!





Needlecraft October 1928 had some so typical 1928 patterns. The waistline had come up slightly and the dresses had a straight up and down look. I personally do not like the look of 1928. I think 1930 and 1931 are just prettier.

Pattern 3366 is the one I like best of these patterns. It was designed for 16 and 18 years and for 36, 38, 40, 42 and 44 bust measurements.

Pattern 898 is shirred along the dropped waistline giving it distinction. It was designed for 16, 18 and 20 years. Also 36, 38, 40, and 42 bust measurements.

Pattern 3136 was described as decidedly chic and was available in 16 and 18 years, 36, 38, 40, 42, 44, and 46 bust measurements.

Pattern 2538 was described as a semi-sports frock. It was available in 16 and 18 years, 36, 38, 40, 42, 44, and 46 bust sizes.
