

WHOA!

As many of you know, I have an engine that is still in it's breaking-in stage after a total engine rebuild in May. I should be past that breaking-in stage but it's been so very hot this summer that I have avoided driving it anywhere to which I don't want to arrive looking like I've been in a sauna: dripping wet with matted hair.

After about the first 50 miles with my rebuilt engine, it catastrophically blew the head gasket and water was everywhere! So I've been especially nervous about taking it on the highway and going my normal lickety-split 53 mph. Instead, I've been driving around Aiken at a sedate 30-35 mph and occasionally getting up to 45 for short periods of time.

I signed up for the Moonshine & Prohibition reenactment on September 19 and met downtown with the rest of the Aiken participants for the 25-mile trip to Edgefield. My first highway trip. We were running a bit late and I was the lead car. Others in the group wanted me to keep it under 45mph which was fine with me.

Just a few miles into our trip, after easily cruising along at 45 mph, I was starting to feel comfortable with driving my new engine on the highway. I had gotten quite nervous after destroying the engine and then with the blown head gasket shortly after the rebuild... but all seemed to be going well. I started to relax when all of a sudden, the car seemed to lose all it's power. I was on flat road with my pedal to the floor and barely going 30 mph. Fortunately the road widened just before the interstate on ramp so there was room to pull off. The other four cars pulled in behind as I lifted the

hood expecting another blown head gasket but all seemed dry. By then others had come to see what the problem was and after gunning the engine a few times, the prognosis was "junk" in the carburetor. I was back on the road and again cruising along at 45 mph. The car didn't feel right so I pulled off in front of a dilapidated shack and reached for the emergency brake...OH POOH!...it was already on! Boy, did I feel stupid. At this point I was ready to turn around and head home. But I made it the rest of the way without incident (and home again, too). Once I arrived in Edgefield, several people reassured me that everyone's done it at one time or another.

Two weeks later, a bunch of us met for coffee in Aiken and one of the folks admitted to me that when he left the International-Model-A-Day event in Aiken the week before, he had driven a few miles and had gotten up to about 45mph when he looked down and saw that he, too, had been driving with the emergency brake on!

In my case, I need to slow down, calm down, and not allow myself to get so frazzled when things go wrong. But it's reassuring to know I'm not alone.

BENEATH THE WHEEL

(With apologies to Hermann Hess)

I've just been looking over some of the pictures from the Edgefield Shootout. What a fun time, and our members and their cars played a major role!

I want to thank Shelia McPherson and Theresa McMullin for volunteering to coordinate this year's Christmas Party! Thanks Ladies!!!!

But, I also want to talk about safety. These cars are a blast to drive and I really love doing that. So far this year, I've driven my two cars just shy of 3600 miles. The recent Model A accident with two fatalities in Temple City, California makes me realize we have to take care of these cars. I just reviewed the web as well as Ford Barn and have not seen a cause for the Temple City accident. However, there was speculation that it could have been caused by a shortened pitman arm breaking in two. Original Pitman arms are forged as one piece. A shortened pitman arm does make steering easier. Shortening a pitman arm involves cutting out about 1 1/2 inches and re-welding. Even though I got my shortened pitman arm from very experienced welder who I've known for a long time, the process of cutting and re-welding a forged piece of steel can weaken it. Bratton's sells a new manufactured shortened pitman arm that is forged out of chrome moly steel. I figured \$36.90 plus shipping was a good investment.

Another key thing is to keep an eye on your vehicle's maintenance. Because of the increased tempo of my Model A driving, I instituted a weekly check of the brake adjustment and daily checks of oil and water, even before I learned of the Temple City accident. If you're driving your Model A frequently, remember that most lubrication is done at

the 500 mile mark which can easily sneak up on you. It's also good to check for parts falling off. Many of you know about the many tools and spare parts I carry in my trunk. Well, last weekend Brian Roberts, Tom Robert's grandson, noticed that my luggage rack had cracked and I was about to lose that trunk! So keep your cars out on the road, but take the time to give them the TLC they deserve.

Also, remember the Steak Cook out is coming up on October 24 at 1:00 pm at the picnic area below the dam. Bring a covered dish, your own plates and utensils and something to drink. We will eat around 3:00 pm. More information will be coming at the meeting.

And, please remember to contact Jim McPherson or Frank Knapp, our nominating committee, who are seeking candidates for Shade Tree A Officers for 2016.

So, let's get those cars out on the road, and just remember a day broken down on the side of the road in your Model A is better than the best day at work!



MEETING MINUTES

September 14, 2015 Richard's Garage

President Eric Shogren opened the meeting at 7:00 by recounting the past several weeks of using his Model A as his main means of transportation since selling his modern truck. He is awaiting the receipt of his on-order truck. He said it was a pleasant break in his day to drive between meetings in his Model A.

There were 38 members present and no visitors or guests.

For Show and Tell Eric passed around a rebuilt leakless (but not lubrication-free) water pump. Old Business:

Eric thanked Doug Wilson for setting up the August dinner meeting at Sconyers and commented that it was a good turnout.

Don Turley said that he had attended the Swap meet at the Cofer Collection in Lilburn GA. He said that it was a good turn out for a one-day event and that there were a lot of vendors.

Saturday, September 19, 2015, Aiken SC





NUTS & BOLTS

- Before using the crank to line up the first cylinder, pad any protruding hood ornament (such as the pointy-beaked quail) to avoid head injury.
- When tightening the head, number the bolts with masking tape and a marker to keep the pattern of tightening correct.

MODEL A FATAL CRASH IN CA

A couple in Temple City CA was killed on August 31 when the 1931 Model A in which they were riding crashed into a tree and burst into flames. It is believed that they died as a result of the impact.

The Los Angeles County coroner's office identified the couple as Florean Frank Izbinski, 81, and Cristina Alicia Izbinski, 67. They were members of the Santa Anita A's.

The cause of the crash and of the fire that immediately followed have not been determined.

CARING FOR YOUR MODEL A FORD, BAT-TERY CARE

Summer Heat can take a Toll on your Battery

Summer heat can zap the life out of your battery. The following tips can help you avoid trouble.

- Have your battery load tested to assure it is in peak condition
- Keep your battery terminals clean to avoid corrosion
- Check the water level and fill with distilled water
- Remove fuse or turn off battery switch when parked overnight
- If car is in storage, use a battery tender to keep battery fully charged

Proper Care for your Battery

We all know the frustration of going out to the garage, climbing into your Model A and finding a dead or low battery. Even worse, you could be on a tour or away from home and have a dead battery. Avoid an expensive tow, or service, with a few simple tips for keeping your battery in top condition. Check your battery at least once per driving season.

Step one: Keep it clean

Clean any corrosion from the top of the battery, and keep the battery cables and connections clean with a post cleaner.

Since you will be working under the your drivers floorboard, take some time to cover the upholstery to keep everything free of hand prints and battery acid. Use a tablespoon of baking soda, and some water to really clean the top of the battery. Remove the battery cables and clean the battery connections thoroughly with a battery post cleaner. These are available at any auto parts store and should be in every Model A owners toolbox. When you get the connections clean, wipe some electrical grease on the posts before rein-

stalling the cables. This will assure a good connection for many years.

Step two: Check the electrolyte level

If the level is low, use only distilled water, and don't overfill.

Gently remove the covers of the battery cells. The water level should be even with the bottom of the holes in the battery. If it needs water, use only clean distilled water. Do not be tempted to use tap water as it contains minerals and impurities which will shorten your battery life.

<u>Step three</u>: Use a hydrometer to test the electrolyte in each cell.

A fully charged battery should read 1.265 or higher. Check each cell for consistency.

Sure signs of a bad battery.

Inspect your battery for cracks or damage to the outer case. Also look for swelling of the case near the battery posts. Another sure sign of a bad battery is excessive sulfur build up inside the cells of the battery. Batteries normally don't last more than about six years, so also look to see if there is a date stamp or sticker on the outside of the battery.

MODEL A Q&A'S

What a great hobby we all enjoy. Just think of it, we keep these Model A's on the road, enjoy driving them on beautiful days. We get to go places we perhaps may never go, always being greeted with a smile and a wave from passersby. It's fun working on them, learning new things, and making them better. Then if we do it right, we can consider these old cars an investment, maybe earning a little money over the years, much more fun than a bank CD. And the best part of all is how these old cars tend to pull the family together. Rarely can you start one up without someone wanting to go for a ride.

Q: I have a 1931 Deluxe Roadster that was repainted several years ago. The car looks nice, but it does not have pinstripes. Can I use pin striping tape? How will I know what color to use?

A: I would suggest hand-painted pinstripes. If you are in North Georgia, contact me and I will refer a young man who does a great job on all the cars in our shop. Get a copy of the Model A Paint and Finish guide, available at Mike's "A" Ford-able. This has good diagrams of each model and how the pinstripes should look, and what color goes with each paint scheme. Generally you match the colors of the wheels.

Q: I am working on my 1929 Tudor. I would like to install a new top. I see the top kits are available, is this something I can do myself?

A: I believe with a little patience, some basic tools, and a good plan of action, you should be able to handle this. One thing to

look out for, if your top is old and has been leaking then the wood will probably need to be replaced. This can be a bigger job than the actual top. I believe the "Les Andrews Model A Mechanics Handbook Vol. II" has some pretty good information about this job.

Q: I have owned my 1930 Coupe for many years now. Last week I was driving it and had a real scare. I came down a long hill to an intersection when the light suddenly turned red. I put all the weight I had on the brake pedal, but the car would not stop. I went right through the intersection. Fortunately there was no accident, but I am thinking now I really need some brake work.

A: Unfortunately Model A's have a reputation for poor brakes. This reputation comes from old original brakes which have never had anything done to them. Your car has probably been fine for short drives around town at low speeds, however, you found out the brakes are no good for a Panic Stop. I am sure your car needs a brake job. If you do a full brake job with cast iron drums, new brake shoes, and new hardware, then your car will stop like it is supposed to. Look at my website for more information on brakes. A good quality, properly done, mechanical brake job on a Model A Ford will provide a safe, reliable car, even in a "panic" stop.

TECH TIP: LEAKING VALVE STEM Jim McPherson

Jim Dover recently bought a new set of tires and inner tubes for his Model A. After mounting the tires and tubes, he experienced all the inner tubes leaking down, from the valve stem. He called the supplier, and they sent him another set of inner tubes (good for them). He installed the second set of inner tubes and experienced the same thing, leakage from the valve stem.

Upon closer examination, the valve core was not seating tight enough to prevent air leakage from the tube. Jim removed the valve cores and soaked them in brake fluid for a couple of days, then reinstalled them. NO MORE LEAKAGE. The brake fluid swelled the rubber ring on the valve core, which makes the seal, just enough to get a proper seal.


