Happy New Year and welcome to 2016! Since our foresight is dimmer than our hindsight, let's begin by looking back a hundred years. In 1916, the Ford Model T was the most popular car in the world. That year Ford sold 472,000 of them and the cost for the basic model was \$360.00. Adjusted for inflation, that would be about \$7,000.00 in today's currency. By 1918, half of all cars in America were Ford Model T's.

Beginning in 1908, Ford manufactured 15,007,034 Model T's before introducing the Model A in December 1927. But competition and innovation among competing car producers was fierce. Between 1922 and 1925 the number of US car manufacturers decreased from 175 to 70 companies. The Model A was an immediate hit with the public and sales soared. Between 1927-1931, a total of 4,858,644 Model A's were produced, making it the best-selling automobile of the era. There were nine body styles and prices ranged from \$500.00 (Tudor sedan) to \$1,200.00 (Town Car). When asked why his cars were so popular, Henry Ford replied: "Our principle is to make our work as profitable for the buyer as for the seller."

While old cars were usually traded in for new ones with more power, driving convenience and durability, many owners saw something special in the Model A Fords and held on to them. Nearly one million Model A's survived to this day, but the same cannot be said of any other car from that era. You and I are the beneficiaries of their insight and loyalty. While today's new cars will quickly depreciate in value, our Model A's become more appreciated as they grow older. Aren't you glad you own one?

Let's make this a good year for every member of the Shade Tree A's.



This year's recipient of the Monroe Wade Award (see sidebar) has been a member of the Shade Tree A's for seventeen years. During that time he has driven his Model A to many National Model A meets, both near (FL) and far (VA, OH, MI), Regional Meets (TN, AL, FL), local Model A events and parades. He even drove his Model A to one regional event only weeks after major surgery.

While never the object of a roadside seminar, this year's recipient is a frequent contributor to a diagnosis or repair with his farm remedies or railroad experience. Whenever assistance was needed, the recipient was there to help, whether it involved the Model A or a Club function. He was of great assistance in the success of the Shade Tree A's Swap Meets.

This article is the first in a series of articles that will feature Shade Tree A's members and their Model A's. The first few articles in the series will feature the officers of the Shade Tree A's starting with the Shade Tree A's President, Chuck Howell. After the remaining Club officers have been featured, other Shade Tree A's members will be featured in future newsletters.

Charles (Chuck) L. Howell

Charles (Chuck) L. Howell served more than 30 years in the United States Army and retired on August 1, 2012. In his last assignment, he served as the Installation Management Command Chaplain, training, managing, and supervising 251 Chaplains serving on 83 Army Installations. Prior assignments in the Army include Chaplain at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center. Chuck is an honor graduate of Lee University and a distinguished honor graduate of the Pentecostal Theological Seminary with a Master of Divinity degree. In retirement, Chuck has served as military consultant with Guideposts Magazine and currently serves as a mentor and volunteer Chaplain for Military Officers Association of America. Chuck and his wife, Sharon, have two adult children and six grandsons whom he enjoys playing with.





Chuck was first introduced to Model A's when he spotted one in Washington State in 1994. After retirement from the Army, Chuck thought he needed a hobby working with his hands to cope with the depression effects of winter. Chuck looked on the Internet for a classic car to restore and found a 1930 Tudor Sedan for sale. He called the owner, who was a member of the Shade Tree A's, drove the car, realized it would take a lot of time, work and money to restore it—so he bought it.

Chuck purchased the Model A on January 10, 2014, joined the Shade Tree A's and immediately began restoration of the car under the supervision of master mechanic Richard Dunevent,

Chuck disassembled the Model A down to the frame. The cab, hood and fenders were carried to a body and paint shop for repair and paint. When the body was finished, Chuck reassembled the car on the frame with help from other Shade Tree A's members. Chuck and Sharon installed the upholstery purchased from LeBaron Bonney. Chuck has adjusted the brakes as needed, replaced the window regulators and water pump and changed the oil a couple of times. Chuck says there's not much about a Model A that the average owner can't repair, replace, or adjust with basic tools

and a repair manual. Chuck has driven the car 1,200 miles since restoration was completed on January 18, 2015. A pictorial progression of the restoration project is available on the Shade Tree A's website in the Member Restoration Projects folder.

Unfortunately, Chuck's homeowners association prohibits him from owning more cars or Harley Davidson motorcycles than he can accommodate in his driveway. If he could have another Model A, it would be a 4-door, 3-window Model A, much like the one Bob Collier recently restored. Other cars Chuck is interested in are the iconic cars he saw on the streets and movies from the 50-60s like the '55 T-bird, the '57 Chevy Bel Air, the '58 Corvette, and the '67 GT 350 Mustang. Chuck appreciates the American ingenuity and original thinking of the early $20^{\rm th}$ century reflected in the



products manufactured during that time as opposed to what is made today which seems to merely be fine tuning of previous concepts and designs to achieve greater efficiency.



Chuck doesn't care for large crowds, but likes just about everything to do with the Shade Tree A's. Chuck likes the variety and personalities of the Shade Tree A's members and their collection of classic cars. He enjoys the monthly magazine we all receive from MAFCA and learning new things while working on other members' cars or trucks. He enjoys working with other Model A enthusiasts in repairing and restoring vintage automobiles and appreciates the resources of experience, expertise, tools and

the availability of Richard's Model A garage. He enjoys driving his Model A in a small convoys to nearby towns for lunch and the scenery along the way. While I'm not attracted to Car Shows, I do enjoy driving former colleagues and old friends in my Model A and taking them over to Richard's shop to see the other cars there.

Owning and driving a Model A reminds Chuck of a simpler, more honest and genuine time in American history. A time when taking a drive thru the country was an appreciated experience rather than a rush to work, school or shopping.

Radiator Additives

The first thing that comes to mind is "stop leak". My dad worked at GM for many years and every car that came down the assembly line got a dose of "Stop Leak". If you have a very slight coolant leak, then a bottle of "Stop Leak" might help. It will not help a leaky water pump. Admittedly, we had a Model A with a seriously cracked engine block. We tried a container of "Block Sealant" and it actually worked. This was an older engine, and it was worth a try. As far as I know the man is still driving the car. Another popular radiator additive is "Waterwetter", intended to help keep the engine cool. A lot of guys swear by it. I have never used it. I do recommend regular "Antifreeze", just to keep your water from becoming rusty.

Fuel Additives

There are lead additives for older cars. If your Model A has had the engine rebuilt the last 20 years, then it probably has hardened valve seats and lead is not needed. There are also additives to combat ethanol in modern fuel. My advice is to run ethanol free fuel in your Model A. There are also "Fuel System Cleaners" out there. Guess what the main ingredient is ... ethanol!

Oil additives:

The first thing that comes to mind here is "Marvel Mystery Oil". The name alone makes it worth buying. You can pour this in oil or in your gas. Just keep a can on the shelf so you can look at the cool vintage label. There are also "Zinc" additives, designed for older cars. We have inspected engines which have been run for many years without "Zinc" additives. We did not see any unusual wear. There are also additives intended to keep your engine from leaking oil or smoking. I heard someone say Model A's are old enough to smoke, and they don't leak oil anyway, they just "mark their spot" handy.

Tire Additives

Someone asked me the other day about using nitrogen in Model A tires to improve fuel mileage. Let me know how that works. There are also products designed to repair or prevent leaks.

So, what is your experience? My overall thought is that most additives are designed to take advantage of the "Placebo Effect". If you think they are working then they are working. Most times you are simply masking a problem by using an additive. But occasionally some "Snake oil" might come in handy.






The Rumble Seat

The new year brings big changes for the Shade Tree A's. The biggest change from my perspective is that I am now your newsletter editor. Rachel has done a super job the past few years as editor and I thank her for her service and wish her well as she devotes more of her time to the Aiken A's.

You'll notice this newsletter looks quite different from recent newsletters. This is primarily due to the fact that I can't run the software that has been used in the past on my computer. Because of this, I developed an entirely new format using the software that I have. I took advantage of the opportunity and changed the format around; some things are new and some old things are gone.
