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OFF THE RUNNING BOARD

Last month Sharon and I flew to Denver and drove a rental car threw the Rocky Mountains. During our 4,100 mile journey, we found ourselves behind a small convoy of Model A's south of Calgary, Canada. They stopped briefly at a rest area to put more water in their radiators and let their engines cool.



I asked one of the Model A driver's if they planned to traverse the "Going-to-the-Sun-Road" in Glacier National Park. That road crests at 8,800 feet above sea level at a place called Logan's Pass. They all laughed and said the grade was too steep and today's traffic too impatient for such a trip, but told me that riding in one of the restored "Jammers" would be the nearest thing to a Model A ride in the park.

Jammers are 1930s-era buses, which required drivers to double-clutch when changing gears—hence the nickname "gear jammers." The ones driven in Glacier National Park are painted black and red. Those driven in Yellowstone are black and yellow.





Officially, they were sold as the 706 National Park Buses that could carry 14 passengers and had a top speed of 35 MPH. A total of 2,406 of these buses were built by the White Motor Company of Ohio and were driven in seven of our national parks. By 1980, the White Motor Company bankrupt. went The Federal government disapproved three merger proposals that would have saved the White Motor Company, and its assets were eventually bought by Volvo.

Both Glacier and Yellowstone sold all of their "Jammers" by 1967 but so many tourists requested a ride in them that the two Parks bought a few back in 2007. The 1930's bodies were mounted on new Ford frames with 330-cubic-inch Ford V-8 engines, automatic transmissions, power brakes and steering. All surviving vehicles still have the original license plates, classic looks and "Ahooga" sounding horns.

Most visitors no longer arrive by train and now drive their own cars through the parks, but many sign up for tours in the *Jammers* because they are the coolest-looking ride in the park. I found it impossible to get a seat on one of these buses in either park because they are booked months in advance mostly by young people.

It was good to meet a few Model A enthusiasts in Canada, and I was glad to learn that vintage era cars remain as popular as ever with the public.


It was actually Adam who pointed out that we should say thank you, so I suggested that we also return the favor and pass on another resource! He did some more research and found this for you:


And the Model A Ford Kept Rambling Right Along

This column contains maintenance, diagnostic, and technical tips to aid you in keeping your Model A on the road and operating at peak performance. I have stolen this information from a variety of sources, including forums, websites, books, publications, and discussions with fellow Model A owners.

Lubrication. During the September Shade Tree A's meeting, Jim McPherson presented a technical program on Model A and AA lubrication. The table below contains the schedule and recommended lubricants that Jim presented. Jim also provided lubrication charts for the Model A cars and Model AA trucks. A similar chart from the January 1928 Ford Service Bulletin is shown below. Poster size lubrication charts are available from parts suppliers and can also be found on Internet sites such as the Ford Garage (http://www.fordgarage.com/pages/modelalubrication.htm).
