### **March Technical Program**

Robbie Jones presented the March Technical Program on using electrolysis for removing rust. Although many present at the meeting had heard of the process, most had not used it before. Robbie recently used electrolysis to remove rust from the cylinder of a hit and miss engine he is restoring. Robbie showed how to use a 5 gallon bucket but used a plastic trash can for the hit and miss engine cylinder. An old rusty Model T wheel spindle was presented to show how the cleaned surface appears.

Exhaust manifold beginning to be cleaned. Bubbles forming but little rust on the surface of the solution yet.


#### SHADE TREE A'S MEMBER PROFILE

#### **TECHNICAL TOPICS**

#### And the Model A Ford Kept Rambling Right Along

This column contains maintenance, diagnostic, and technical tips to aid you in keeping your Model A on the road and operating at peak performance. I have stolen this information from a variety of sources, including forums, websites, books, publications, and discussions with fellow Model A owners.

**Air.** Maintaining the correct air pressure ensures both good steering and longer tire life. However, adding air to the inner tubes of your Model A may be difficult. The inner tube may have a long rubber stem or the original metal valve stem, allowing the wire spoke wheel to interfere with the addition of air or checking air pressure. Bending the rubber valve stem outward to better access the valve is a common practice, but results in the valve stem being cut by the rim, often resulting in failure down the road. The inner tub with a short valve stem has not been manufactured for some time.

An additional problem is the shape of the part of the air filler chuck which contacts and pushed open the valve stem valve, called the poppet valve. This part may be too large to work easily with the

poppet valve, making it difficult for the chuck to open the valve. The air filler chuck can be easily taken apart and the shape of the contact part of the chuck modified by filing, so that it better fits and opens the poppet valve.

To easily add air to your inner tubes, you might consider purchasing a 90 degree valve extender, or a set of them. This is not a new invention, but is a newer version. The valve extender has a female

threaded cap on one end which attaches to the tube valve stem. The other end has a male threaded end over which the air chuck fits. The valve extender may pivot while the threaded cap is loose so that you can position the extender to make the addition of air easier. If you decide to leave the extenders installed permanently, make sure they are tight. They may tend to loosen while driving. Tire pressure is affected by a variety of factors and should be checked once a month, and for accuracy, only when the tire is cold.
