Maintaining the Model A Ford Radiator and Cooling System

Lots of people ask me about their radiators. There are several common problems that I thought we could address in this month's article. I **will** try to cover the basics, if you have any additional questions, call me anytime.

A Healthy cooling system: A wellmaintained radiator and cooling system should be free of any leaks. The coolant temperature should remain within 100° of the temperature outside. In other words, 80° an day the coolant on temperature should stay under 180°. Measure with a temperature gage or laser thermometer at the upper water neck. Your coolant should never be a rusty color, and you should not have to add more than a quart of coolant during a normal drive. Keep in mind that a Model A cooling system is open to the outside atmosphere so you will lose coolant, you just shouldn't lose much.

Leaks:

The

most common leak is at the water pump. This can be corrected by rebuilding your water pump or replacing it with a "leakless" modern water pump. Another common leak is at the radiator cap. This will cause water to splash onto your windshield. This is not an overeating problem, just a problem with your cap sealing gasket. If you have a Quail or Moto-meter, you will have multiple gaskets, so you may have to spend some time making sure you have a good seal at the top of the radiator. If your radiator is leaking in the core, then a trip to the radiator shop or a new radiator may be in order. Of course hoses can also be a source of leaks. Just check everything carefully.

Rusty Coolant: Keep at least 1/2 gallon of anti-freeze in the car year round to prevent rust.

Flushing your cooling system: If you do have rusty water in your cooling system, you can try flushing it out with a garden hose. Make sure your engine is cool, then remove the upper radiator hose. Place a garden hose and the top of your radiator and turn on the water at a medium rate. Allow your engine to idle, letting the freshwater flush down to your radiator and up through your engine and out onto your clean driveway. The rusty stains will remain there for years. There are also some excellent chemical flushing agents available at your local auto parts store which will really clean the system well. Just follow the directions on the container.

More advanced problems: You can have more advanced problems such as a leak at your head gasket. If water disappears from your cooling system at an alarming rate or if you get water contamination in your oil then you can pressure test your cooling system to find hidden leaks. These pressure test kits are available at auto parts stores, sometimes they will even loan you the kit free of charge. Keep in mind you will need to plug off the overflow pipe before you can pressure test.

Still having problems? If you had checked everything above and still have overheating problems, then I would recommend a new radiator such as a Brassworks. Your original radiator is almost 90 years old, and they do wear out. Let me know if we can help.
