## The Henry Ford Complex in Dearborn, Michigan

Sharon and I have now toured all 50 states of the nation. This month we spent a couple of weeks in Michigan and Wisconsin.

We took two days in Dearborn to visit the Henry Ford Museum of Innovation, the Automotive Hall of Fame and the Greenfield Village, a 250 acre replica of America from 1863-1947 (Henry's lifetime). We didn't have the time for the Model T tour of the Rouge River Plant, which makes the F150 truck, the most popular Ford vehicle selling more that 40 million. We really learned a lot about innovation in all fields of technology as well as automotive history in Dearborn and would recommend it to our STA members.

Of course, we visited more places in Michigan than Dearborn: Detroit, Frankenmuth, Saginaw, Mackinaw, Manistique, etc., but I didn't include any photos from those places since they aren't relevant to the STA. Surprisingly, Michigan and Wisconsin are mostly forest and farm land with lots of wildlife--black bear, eagles, elk, fish, moose, etc.

## THE SHADE TREE A'S – THIRTY YEARS AGO



The 1985-2005 Shade Tree A's newsletters are now available on the Shade Tree A's website. They can be accessed via the same "button" as the other newsletters, but they are password protected. The same password used to access the member roster is used to access the newsletters. Thank you Dan Perla for scanning these and posting on the website.

The September 1988 issue of the Shade Tree A's Newsletter included an update on the restoration of Flora, the then Club President's, Larry Komp's, Tudor. The Club calendar was loaded with upcoming opportunities: many flea markets and car shows. A long list of automobile related trivia questions was also published, such as:

- 1. Restorers concerned with absolute authenticity need to be aware of parts changes as they affect their particular model, year and estimated production date. An excellent source for this information is \_\_\_\_\_\_.
- 2. On \_\_\_\_\_\_ Ford closed all its US assembly plants.
- 3. Production line photos show that by \_\_\_\_\_\_, bodies were dropped from the upper floor of the assembly line onto the chassis.
- 4. The car ready for paint was called \_\_\_\_\_
- 5. In painting, \_\_\_\_\_\_ coats of primer were applied. The body then received the base (lower body) color. It was then masked and painted for the other color if necessary.

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### **TECHNICAL TOPICS**

#### And the Model A Ford Kept Rambling Right Along

This column contains maintenance, diagnostic, and technical tips to aid you in keeping your Model A on the road and operating at peak performance. I have stolen this information from a variety of sources, including forums, websites, books, publications, and discussions with fellow Model A owners.

The other day, I was reading an article on fuel system leaks in *Skinned Knuckles* magazine (August, 2018, Vol. 42, No. 8). Under gas tanks, they showed a picture of a Model A gas tank. At the end of the article was an Editor's Note, announcing a vastly improved carburetor needle valve and seat assembly by Daytona Parts Company and directing you to their website for more information. I was hooked.

First, let's review the Model A Zenith carburetor needle valve and seat assembly. Originally, the assembly was made up of a brass seat assembly and a steel pointed needle. When the carburetor leaked gas, we blamed the needle valve and seat assembly. In fact, we may never have a leakless float valve assembly. Due to the vibration and bouncing down the road, there is ware on the needle and seat, providing an area for leakage or seeping to occur. Original used assemblies are not hard to find. If you have one, you can chuck the needle in an electric drill (actually a Dremel tool works better) and spin it while holding and applying a little pressure to the brass seat.

This will burnish the assembly, providing a leakless assembly. Currently available assemblies (Figure 1) are caged such that the needle valve is not removable and the needle may be Viton tipped for better sealing.

An era improvement on the needle valve assembly was the Gross Jet. The Gross Jet replaced the needle with two ball bearings. The idea was two ball bearings would seal better than the steel needle. Some Model A owners love them, and others don't. One problem is as they sit, the gas evaporated off the ball bearings, leaving a varnish coat, resulting in sticking of the ball

bearings and leaking gas. A caged version of the Gross Jet (Figure 2) is now available. Regardless of which assembly you use, the proper way to adjust the needle valve assembly, and thus the float assembly, is to add gaskets to the assembly. A shim set is now available to accomplish this task (Figure 3). Adjustment by bending the float may result in a crack in the float itself.

Unfortunately, the new needle valve assembly from Daytona Parts Company is not available Model for the A. However, I learned a lot from my inquiry with Ron Hewett and I would like to share the construction of their valve assemble and our exchange. Thev have replaced the pointed valve/seat with a flat seat and valve made with an ethanol resistant material. fluorocarbon elastomer rubber, on the

VALVE BODY... The DAYTONA FLOAT VALVE body differs from the standard valve in one vital respect; one end of the orifice has an inverted flare design and this "raised shoulder" allows the flat fluorocarbon rubber disc to seat perfectly each time, increase fuel flow rate, and control excess fuel pump pressures.

needle. The flat disc fits in a concave opening at the end of the needle. This opening has a high point of center, which allows the disc to float and seat properly at all times. Being flat, the valve is much more responsive, allowing a full flow of gas into the carburetor, and shuts off completely as the float rises. Figure 5 shows how both valve assemblies affect gas flow into the bowl. The valve body differs from



other assemblies in that one end of the orifice has an inverted flare design, and this "raised shoulder" allows the float rubber disc to seat perfectly each time.

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#### **TECHNICAL TOPICS**

The new information Ron supplied shed new light on the carburetor leaking problem. Part of the issue we are having is the inherent nature of "updraft" carburetors. They ALL leaked fuel after engine shutoff!! Some just worse than others, along with early dirty contaminated gas, steel needle and seat assemblies, etc., causing flood-over during driving. This is why auto manufacturers went to "downdraft" carburetors in the early 1930's, along with many other engineering reasons. Auto fires were very common early on. I could go on for hours, based on our 45 years of carburetor experience. So, most of the information coming from owners of early updraft carbureted vehicles is based not on engineering information, but their own misinterpretation of the basic problem. While our Daytona Float Valves would certainly prevent excess fuel levels in the bowls, causing rich running and flood-overs; it would not stop the normal flow of fuel, due to condensation, back out of the manifold after shutting the engine off. By the way, side draft style carburetors suffer from the same problems, in one form or another.

Figure 6 demonstrates what happens during various driving conditions. While they are talking about their Daytona Float Valve, I think it provides an insight to our carburetors.
