#### **Under New Business:**


Matt reminded everyone that this year's St. Patrick's Day Parade will be held Saturday, March 16<sup>th</sup>. More info to come on line-up times and location.

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



# **MARC Driving Awards Program**

A one-time registration fee of \$1.00 is required and the program is open to all MARC members. The first award is given at 2,000 miles and every 5,000 miles thereafter. Mileage does not have to be earned all in one year and can accumulate from year to year.



#### Dear Sir:

Dear Sir:--Me're writing this letter to you today because we want to help you get your money out of your Model T. It's still as good a car as it was the day the new Model A Ford was announced and there's no need to sacrifice it. The Model T Ford is still used by more people than any other automobile. Eight million are in active service right now and many of them can be driven one, two, three and five years and even longer. Bring your car to us and let us look it over. You'll be surprised to see how little it costs to put it in tip-top shape. New fenders, for instance, cost from \$3.50 to \$5.00 each, with a labor charge of \$1.00 to \$2.50. Tuning up the motor and replacing commutator case, brush and vibrator points costs only \$1.00, with a small charge for material. Brake shoes can be installed and emergency brakes equalized for a labor charge of only \$1.25. A labor charge of \$4.00 to \$5.00 will cover the overhauling of the front axle, rebushing springs and spring perches, and straightening, aligning and adjusting wheels. The labor charge for overhauling the average rear axle runs from \$5.75 to \$7.00. Grinding valves and cleaning carbon can be done for \$8.00 to \$4.00. A set of four new pistons and rings cost only \$7.00. For a labor charge of \$20 to \$25.00 you can have your motor and transmission completely overhauled. Parts are extra.



# **January Technical Program**

Jimmy Rivers, owner of Jimmy Rivers Performance Works, gave a very interesting and informative talk on powder coating. Powder coating is an electrostatically applied coating that is sprayed on as a powder. The finish is then baked on to permanently bond the part and the powder. The result is a finish much more resistant to abrasion and corrosion than conventional paints that will last for years to come. Powder coating also allows a thicker application without running or sagging.



Prior to powder coating, parts are

first chemically stripped then media blasted. Parts are then acid washed, rinsed, dried and then coated. Jimmy's oven can accommodate whatever will fit in his 6' high x 6' wide x 10' long oven. Parts are placed into the oven and brought to temperature (375-400°F) then baked for ten minutes once at temperature. Generally, a maximum of three coats can be applied before surface finish begins to be affected (e.g. orange peel). Jimmy can coat in a variety of colors including chrome and fluorescent colors. Some colors like the chrome and fluorescent colors are UV sensitive. Powder coating is more chemical resistant than paint but not totally. Lacquer thinner and acetone will attack it.



Because the powder coating must be baked, typical body fillers cannot be used. There may be some metal type fillers available that can withstand the baking temperatures. Existing powder coats can be coated over but adhesion is dependent on the original coat. Clear coats can be applied but the clear can change the color slightly. Jimmy has powder coated a variety of items including lawn furniture and Yeti cups. Coatings can be applied as a two-tone but the process is more tedious.

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# THE SHADE TREE A'S – THIRTY YEARS AGO



The cover of the February 1989 issue of the Shade Tree A's Newsletter contains a picture of an actual license plate. A handy guide for identifying the year of Model A production was also included. The Newsletter also included an article on Peter Helck. In the heyday of commercial illustration in the Thirties



and early Forties. Helck was one of the top men in the field, handling a wide variety of topics. Then. as illustrations were replaced by photography, he landed a job that set the stage for the second half of his career. It was an assignment from *Esquire* to illustrate several great moments in American sports. and Peter chose scenes from racing. # Jim's technical tip

Radiator Hoses - Hard to Get On, Hard to Get Off!

For many years I had a hard time getting new radiator hoses on the engine to seal well. I would tighten the hose clamps to what I thought was reasonable, and they still seeped a bit of coolant. And years later, when I needed to remove the hoses, they seemed to be glued to the metal parts and I had to pry them off or cut them off.

A Master Mechanic shared his secret with me years ago. Apply a very thin coating of a specialized gasket dressing called "Hylomar AF" to the inside of the new hoses where they will contact the metal just before installing them. Install and rotate each hose back and forth, to spread the sealant out evenly. Now tighten hose clamps and you are done. It will not seep or leak. And years later when you need to remove the hose, it will come right off!

I get the Hylomar AF (Advanced Formulation) -- originally developed by Rolls Royce for their jet engines -- from an industrial supply place near me called W.W. Grainger. It's also available on Amazon and other places on the Internet. Compare prices because some places price it like it's gold!

There are several variants of Hylomar. You don't want the original "Hylomar Universal Blue" or the "Racing Formula". The Hylomar AF works best for our application. I also put a little on my oil drain plug threads, on the transmission and differential drain plugs, etc., to stop the drips. It gives a good seal but never hardens, so it's easy to take it apart later.
