

Martinez, GA—CSM James Norman Dover, US Army (Ret), beloved husband of the late Hildegard Dover, entered into rest on Saturday, September 5, 2020 at the residence of his son, Josh. Funeral services will be held at 11:00 AM on Saturday, September 12, 2020 at the Bellevue Mausoleum Chapel. Entombment will follow the service. Mr. Dover, a native of Clover, SC, was a 27-year veteran of the US Army. He was a paratrooper who served in Europe during World War II, as well as serving two tours in Korea and two tours of Vietnam. He retired with the rank of Command Sergeant Major. After his retirement, he started a new career as founder and operator of Expressway Imports. He is survived by his children, James Dover (Mary Ellen), Joshua Dover (Rebecca), and Richard Dover (Susan), his grandchildren, Julie, Teresa, Stuart and Evan, and his brother and sister, Robert Dover (Caroline) and Alice Robinson. He was preceded in death by his wife, Hildegard, and his daughter, Diana Joan Peters.

# Evans veteran Jim Dover recalls D-Day invasion 75 years later By Jozsef Papp

Jim Dover served 28 years in the Army, a time that spanned World War II, the Korean War and the Vietnam War.

Dover was only 18 in 1943 when he enlisted as World War II dragged on in Europe and the Pacific. He joined the paratroopers, and a year later he would be at one of the most important days in history and a tipping point in the war.

Thursday marks the 75th anniversary of D-Day, the invasion by Allied troops on the beaches of France on June 6, 1944. Dover, now 95, went to Europe in 1944 when his training was completed. He was part of the 101st Airborne Division and one of the thousands of American troops that landed in Normandy on that day.

"We jumped out of one plane called a C47, a cargo plane. It had one door to jump out of," Dover said. "The plane was set up, it had a bench down each side. There (was) 12 seats for 12 men on each side." He said he remembers too much about that day. He was on the left side of the plane and was with the first group of 12 men to jump. The plane was supposed to go over the drop zone, group one would jump, then it would circle back and the second group would jump. However, the plane never circled back. "It was shot down," Dover said.

On the ground, the paratroopers assembled and formed two rifle squad and a machine gun squad before starting to fight. Dover said almost everyone got hit. They fought, but losing those 12 men still sticks with him.

"We did what we had to do to survive," he said. "Losing 12 men is not something you are going to forget overnight."

It is estimated more than 160,000 Allied troops landed at Normandy, which included 73,000 Americans. By the end of the day, it is estimated that 10,000 servicemen from all sides were killed, wounded and missing in action.

Dover feels lucky he survived. "I felt lucky. I guess that is the main thing," he said. "I felt lucky and glad it was over with."

Following the battle in Normandy, Dover said his group remained in Europe. It was on his 21st birthday when they heard the news that the war was over.

"It ended on my 21st birthday. We were near Austria, we had already crossed Germany. We were near the Austrian border," Dover said. "We had a party."

After the war, he stayed in the Army rather than go back home to a farm in North Carolina. He was sent to Austria and assigned to Gen. Mark Clark's headquarters in Vienna for four years. It was during his time in Vienna that he met his wife of 69 years, Hildegard Dover.

Dover served two combat tours in Korea and was awarded a battlefield commission in 1952. He became a sergeant major after the Korean War. He also served in Vietnam before having to medically retire after 28 years in the Army. He was disappointed because he planned on staying for 30 years.

"When I first came back from Vietnam, the second time, I was hospitalized at Norfolk Navy Hospital for 7 1/2 months," Dover said. "I woke up in the Navy and I said, 'What the hell am I doing in the Navy, I'm in the Army.' Then, they transferred me to Fort Gordon and processed me out."

He arrived at Fort Gordon in 1971. It took him some time to adjust to civilian life, but he now resides in Evans with his wife.

For him, he will always remember the camaraderie during his time in the Army, even if friends were only temporary at times. He still wears a hat which commemorates the wars he fought in to remember his friends.

At 95, he said he would do it all over again.

"Under the same circumstances, if we had the same world we live in, yes, I would have done the same thing if the situation was the same," he said.







## THE SHADE TREE A'S - THIRTY YEARS AGO

# Jim's Tech Tip by Jim Cannon

# Installing A New Fuel Line

When installing a new fuel line between the sediment bowl and the carburetor, you want to get the little brass ferrule locked down on the tubing about 1/8" from the end of the tubing. It is difficult to see where the ferrule is located on the tubing, though, when the end is inside the carburetor or the sediment bowl. Here's my little trick to getting it where you want it.

On the bench, before installing anything on the car, slip the tube nut and ferrule on the end of the fuel line like it will be installed on the car. See the photo. Place the ferrule on the tubing with 1/8" of tubing showing on the end. Gently press the nut up against the ferrule and mark that location with a little piece of masking tape.

Now when you install the tubing on the carburetor or sediment bowl, you hold the tubing in so that the tape is right at the edge of the nut while you tighten the nut. When the ferrule gets clamped down on the tubing, it will be in the right spot. You can take it apart to check.

I apply a few drops of oil to the threads of the nut and to the ferrule when tightening it all up for the first time, to help everything turn smoothly as it's being clamped in place. Teflon tape should not be needed on these tube nuts and ferrules; they are designed to seal with just the nut being tightened. It does not hurt to put a thin film on non-hardening sealant on the ferrule, though, before installing, for extra protection against weeping fuel.

I hope this helps the installation of your next fuel line easier. Have a Model A Day! Jim


