#### Old Business:




New Business:



### A Stitch in Time.....



Fancy handwork and stitching has adorned fashion since the Scythian culture estimated to be from the 5<sup>th</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup> centuries BC. The T'ang (618-967 AC) and the Ch'ing dynasty (1644-1911 AC) displayed elaborately decorated on garments with embroidery.

During the Victorian era (1830-1890), beautiful stitching was a symbol of a person's class and wealth. Collars, sleeves, and those bell-shaped floor-length skirts were brought to life with a third dimension of stitching, applique', and stump work or raised work.

The Edwardian era of fashion (1900-1910) also showed fancy stitching as a sign of elegance and a strict social rule worn by only the wealthy.

The Industrial Revolution resulted in the development of commercial sewing and weaving machines. The mass production of textiles, fabric and yarns opened up the markets to a larger section of the population at a cheaper cost and in a faster time. The average person had access to more elaborate fabrics for showing off their handwork and stitching skills.

During the Model A Era, hand stitching was seen mostly on women's and children's clothes. Many household items were also decorated with hand stitching. Stitching designs were the result of creative artisans using thread made of cotton, silk, wool, and even linen. Model A Era stitchers used various stitching techniques to add charm, glamor, elegance, and an element of desirability to their garments.

### **MODEL A ERA FASHION AND STYLE**

*Embroidery* is the use of thread to develop a design on fabric. A single color matching the fabric may be used or multiple colors to make the design come alive. Beads and sequins were incorporated with the embroidery to enhance the design, to add glamor, or to show off the stitching skill. Crystal beads were added to clothing and decorative items. Check out *The Book of Crystal Flowers, 1<sup>st</sup> Edition* by Hiawatha, Dritz-Traun Company, NY 1929

*Stump work* is a three-dimensional stitching. The technique uses various thicknesses of threads to give different height of the embroidery. Animals, birds, and plants were common subjects. Many hats were designed with felt stump work on crown and brim.

*Trapunto* is the art of creating raised designs of flowers, geometric designs and arches using batting under the flat fabric. Trapunto could be a smart stitching dimension on woman's suit lapels, necklines, hats and cuffs of a daytime dress.

*Patchwork* is the technique of joining pieces of fabric together with decorative embroidery stitches.

*Applique*' is the process of layering a fabric design on a foundation fabric with raw edges covered by thread of the same color to finish it. This technique lends itself to children's clothes, a young woman's afternoon dress, sporting attire, and some lingerie. The photo to the left shows a child's cotton suit has a cute rabbit for summer fun.

*Silk ribbon embroidery* results in an elegant spray of flowers, animals or an artistic design using silk ribbon instead of thread. Greater space is covered in a shorter time with this technique. Women's undergarments as well as wedding attire would have this fancy style of stitching.

Tatting is lace made with a small hand shuttle, thread, and skillful hands. This type of lace could be used on cuffs, collars, and afternoon dresses. Household items such as pillowcases and handkerchiefs were often treasured if they had tatting. In the photo to the left, the black dress with the white bertha collar has delicate tatting as lace around the collar and cuffs.




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### THE SHADE TREE A'S – THIRTY YEARS AGO



The 1985-2005 Shade Tree A's *Newsletters* are now available on the Shade Tree A's website. They can be accessed via the same "button" as the other *Newsletters*, but they are password protected. The same password used to access the member roster is used to access the *Newsletters*. Thank you Dan Perla for scanning these and posting on the website.

The August 1992 issue of the Shade Tree A's Newsletter includes a story behind the story of a 1930 Deluxe Tudor, an article about the acquisition and restoration of Richard Dunevent's Tudor. [Who wrote this article? Who is the "I" in the article? Ed.] In other news, Frank Knapp was acknowledged for donating \$250 to the "Design the Best Body" contest! The book, The Fords: An American Epic, was reviewed. For the campers out there, an article on using the automobile to go camping in the early 1900's may be interesting. Other books available at the time and advertised in the August 1992 Newsletter include a biography of



Henry Ford titled *The Wayward Capitalist, Richard is masking his Model A body, getting it ready to spray, spring 1985 Automobiles 1906, Auto Manufacture* and *Inventing the Airplane*. Restoration progress was reported on Frank Knapp's 1930 Town Sedan and Speedster and Monroe Wade's red pickup truck.

### **Model A Ford Paint and Pinstriping**

At the Model A Restorers Club National Meet this year, I attended a seminar on Model A Paint and Pinstriping, presented by Jim Brand. Jim is THE expert on pinstriping the Model A. I found the information Jim presented to be most interesting and enlightening and I would like to share some of that information, and my comments, with you.

We have known for years that the Ford Motor Company used "M" numbers to identify products and to provide specifications for those products. Ford actually started using "M" numbers during production of the Model T. Below are two pages of "M" numbers and the name associated with the number. If you were a customer, you would use this "M" number and name to identify the product you wanted. If you were a manufacturer who wanted to supply Ford with a material, you would use the "M" number and product name and obtain the specification associated with that product. This list is just a small sampling of the materials Ford used. There were "M" numbers for all materials associated with manufacturing the Model A, and other Ford products. As an example, for Model A upholstery alone, there are over 2,700 "M" numbers.

Let's take a look at some "M" numbers I find fascinating. For those of you who have restored a Model A, when removing the original finish, you encountered a tough to remove bonderizing layer. This is the only product listed (at the top of the page) which doesn't have an "M" number. It is P-43. Elsewhere in the list, bonderizer is listed as M-160-B. If you wanted to paint your carburetor, you might look in the Model A Judging Standards and Restoration Guidelines and find out the finish was "dull black". When you look for the product in the "M" list, you find M-117 Carburetor Lacquer – One Coat Proposition (Carryover from "T"), and further down the list you find M-137 Carburetor Pyroxylin Lacquer – Pyroxylin based material used on carb bowls and gas gauges- replaces M-117. The M-117 entry is dated 04-02-24 indicating its use on the Model T, and the M-137 entry is dated 05-22-31, indicating a change near the end of Model A production. Does the fact that M-137 is listed as "on carb bowls" indicate there is another "M" number for the upper carburetor assembly, and therefore a different paint specification? Some other interesting entries from the "M" list include M-114 used as the first coat on wire wheels, I thought they only had one coat of paint, M-127 Upholstery Cleaner, also can be used for tar removal (that must be some heavy duty product), and many more.

The two pages beginning with the Ford Motor Company heading present information on pinstriping, listing the "M" numbers for various colors used on the Model A. Of interest here is the requirement for using a #3 sword striping pencil capable of striping a line of 6 feet. Jim Brand offered that a #3 striping brush was large enough to paint a house with. He used a brush three times smaller, and hand picks them from a company in Michigan who supplied striping brushes to Ford during the Model A era. He said a pinstriper gets to know his brushes, and several brushes may be used when applying the pinstripe to a Model A. You should remember that the Model A was painted with

lacquer paint, and the enamel striping paint like we use today would lift the lacquer body paint, thus a fast drying lacquer paint was used for pinstriping. An example of the paint specification is given on the second page. Of interest here is the striping paint should cover in one coat and air dry in 10 minutes.

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
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
