

MAFFI Newsletter Minute September - October, 2022

As you will have read in the MARC *Model A News* and the MAFCA *Restorer* magazines by now the Model A Museum celebrated its 10th anniversary at Model A Days on September 16-17 on the Gilmore campus near Hickory Corners, MI. Those same magazines will have published the MAFFI Hall of Fame (HOF) inductees for the 2022 year. You, however, will probably not read any of the inductee's acceptance speeches.

Howard Minner's became the first person to make his HOF acceptance speech live at the MAFFI Annual Membership Meeting, using "ZOOM" and seen on a big screen television. Below are excerpts from his remarks that history buffs of the Model A hobby will find interesting:

"Two milestone events stand out and I'll make them very brief. Once MAFFI decided to establish a museum, two issues became an immediate focus.

'The first was the obvious question of where the museum would be located. I ended up spending time with other Board members, personally visiting a number of possible sites. Among them the AACA Museum in Hershey, the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, the Petersen in California, the Gilmore, of course here in Michigan and the Early V-8 Museum outside of Auburn, Indiana. The latter had been a prime consideration. But MAFFI Board members subsequently visited the Gilmore and agreed this is where we wanted to be.

'Thereafter, the question arose, what should our museum look like. I, along with Loukie Smith and Stan Johnson, came together and brought along pictures of various Ford dealerships from the Model A Ford era. By chance, I brought along a May 1929 article from a magazine called *Ford Dealer and Service Seal*. This was a private magazine for dealers and edited by Mary Bronstein. Page 40 showed a front face view of a suggested medium size Ford dealership building. That drawing eventually won the day, and that is what you now see as the facade of our MAFFI Museum here at the Gilmore."

You now know, "the rest of the story".

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
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

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

SUN GOGGLES TO SUNGLASSES

The earliest reference we have of colored spectacles being used to block the sun's rays is good old Emperor Nero in ancient Rome. No — he didn't sport his shades when he burned the town down. But he did use polished gems to watch



gladiatorial competitions. The history of sunglasses continues in 12th century China, where pieces of smoky quartz were used by judges while listening to court cases. They weren't for the sun, though. These signature pieces kept people from reading the judges' expressions, much like that cool, aloof kid you went to school with who seemed to wear sunglasses even on rainy days. You could never tell what he was thinking.

During the Renaissance, that great era of enlightenment and innovation, one could argue that the greatest accomplishment to come from this time was the invention of sunglasses. It's believed the first pair was created somewhere between 1268 and 1289. All we know is by 1352 sunglasses appeared in a painting by Tommaso da Modena. After that, the rich and powerful used sunglasses as a symbol of distinction and honor.

Since their earliest uses, sunglasses have gone through a lot of necessary, practical and fashionable changes. By the 1600s, an English spectacle company invented the first pair of prescription sunglasses. But it wasn't until the early part of the 20th century that they became in vogue.

On the beaches of Atlantic City, New Jersey, in 1929, Sam Foster introduced the sunglasses craze to America by selling inexpensive shades to beachgoers. People went crazy for these spectacles, which protected their eyes from the sun' always glorious but often annoying light. From there, sunglasses took on both utilitarian and stylish changes:

• 1930s: Bausch & Lomb develops eyeglasses for the Army Air Corp that reduce high -altitude glare.

• 1936: The Polaroid filter is used for the first time to make polarized sunglasses.

• 1937: Ray-Ban produces aviator-style polarized sunglasses, which become popularized by American movie stars.

As the public saw their favorite celebrities donning spectacular shades, the sunglasses craze took off and has never looked back. Styles have changed through the years — from the Cat Eyes of the '50s to the square frames of the '80s. And what was old becomes new again. One thing we can be sure of, though, is that sunglasses are here to stay.


Crookes Sunglasses were developed by Sir William Crookes and sold by Bausch and Lomb, with special lenses available in light green, medium grey and amber brown tints. He accidentally made a light blue tint that became very popular, although later was known to be toxic.

Sun googles as they were called, caught on quickly as a sporty set of shades for

summer days, but were also promoted as winter wearable "to relieve the eyes from the glare of indoor lighting during the dull afternoons and long evenings of the winter season."

Their initial marketing was promoted for outdoor sports and activities such as driving cars, skiing, and farm work (dust protection.) Some had

leather side piece or full leather cases for extra protection. The casual sun goggle used the same thick frames as eyeglasses.

In 1927, Bausch and Lomb enthusiastically concluded "there is hope that in the not too far distant future it may be possible to make glasses stylish and to sell them as jewelry. That is what we have got to come to." 1920s and 1930s glasses for both men and women comprised of small round frames made of tortoiseshell or metal. In terms of lenses, the 1920s were the beginning of tinted sunglasses as an accessory of fashion over function. Movie stars sunbathing were the first to promote the new trend, and slowly the public caught on to the convenience of shades with access to color tints ranging from dark grey to amber to even deep green in the 1930s. Today, wearing a 1920s or 30s costume in the sun requires for a pair of vintage round sunglasses.


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THE SHADE TREE A'S – THIRTY YEARS AGO

Late 1931 Model A Ford slant windshield Town Sedan belonging to member Rob Hefner.


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TECHNICAL TOPICS

Jim's Tech Tips

"Check Your Rear Axle Nuts"

Every time I have a rear wheel off of a Model A, I use the opportunity to check the tightness of the rear axle nut for that wheel. They are supposed to be quite tight, and yet I find many with at least one axle nut that is loose. This is not good. If the hub is able to move on the axle, it will cause excess wear to the end of the axle and can damage it to the point where the axle will need to be replaced.



To check it, first remove the cotter key. With the transmission in 1st or Reverse gear, and the opposite rear tire on the ground, you can apply a wrench to the axle nut and confirm it is tight.

Ford did not publish torque values for nuts and bolts; he counted on the experience and "feel" of expert mechanics to know how tight to make things. Les Andrews has a value of 125 ft-lbs. in his book for this nut, and I feel that is a good target to shoot for. Watch the position of the cotter pin hole relative to the slots in the axle nut. If the pin will not line up on the nut, keep tightening the nut until the cotter pin goes in. Bend the ears over. I use a new cotter pin every time.

This simple maintenance step will help you avoid bigger problems down the road.



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
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
